

Green River Industry Concerns Twp. Council

An amendment to the Pickering Twp. Official Plan as recommended by Planning Board that would permit the operation of a concrete products manufacturing firm on No. 7 Hwy. at Green River was discussed by Council at a regular meeting on Monday night.

Mr. John Petro, the owner of 8 acres immediately west of Baxendale's store, is desirous of locating the industry on the site.

Reeve Sherman Scott stated that the Council did not wish to curtail any industrial development in the township, either large or small, but feared that some difficulty might arise concerning its control.

Councillor Ross Deakin said that he understood the firm planned to construct lawn ornaments, bird baths, etc. He said that the staff would number about four employees at the beginning and might later expand to twelve.

Deputy-Reeve, Mrs. Jean McPherson suggested that a poll of the people in the area might give the Council some idea of what action they should take.

Reeve Scott stated that the owner had gained some ill-feeling in the area when it was rumoured that he planned to open a wrecking yard. He said that the Planning Board were opposed to any sale of second-hand goods but would not object to the disposal of new materials.

A motion was passed, asking for a recommendation from Project Planning Associates, Toronto.

BILL LOCKIE, ZEPHYR HEADS POTATO CLUB

A number of Ontario County Potato Growers met in the Department of Agriculture Office, Uxbridge, on Monday, April 30, in connection with the re-organization of the 500 Bushel Potato Club. This club was organized in 1945 and has carried out a successful competition each year. Twenty-seven potato growers completed this high yield club in 1961.

The winner of the 1961 competition was Mr. Bill Lockie, Zephyr, with an estimated yield of 704 bushels per acre. The average estimated yield for all twenty-seven growers in the 1961 competition was 457 bushels.

Contestants may use any recommended potato variety they wish and they may use any means at their disposal to secure the highest possible yield from the one acre they have entered in the competition.

Anyone interested in joining this high yield Potato Club for 1962 should send their application together with a \$3.00 membership to the Department of Agriculture Office, Uxbridge, by June 1st.

He said that up until April 28th, the Pickering Village unit had answered forty fire calls in the township. A number of charges are pending before the courts.

"It's the same old package of salt, with the same wrapper and when you open it you find the ingredients aren't worth a nickel," he said.

Labour Minister, Hon. Michael Starr, In Uxbridge May 19

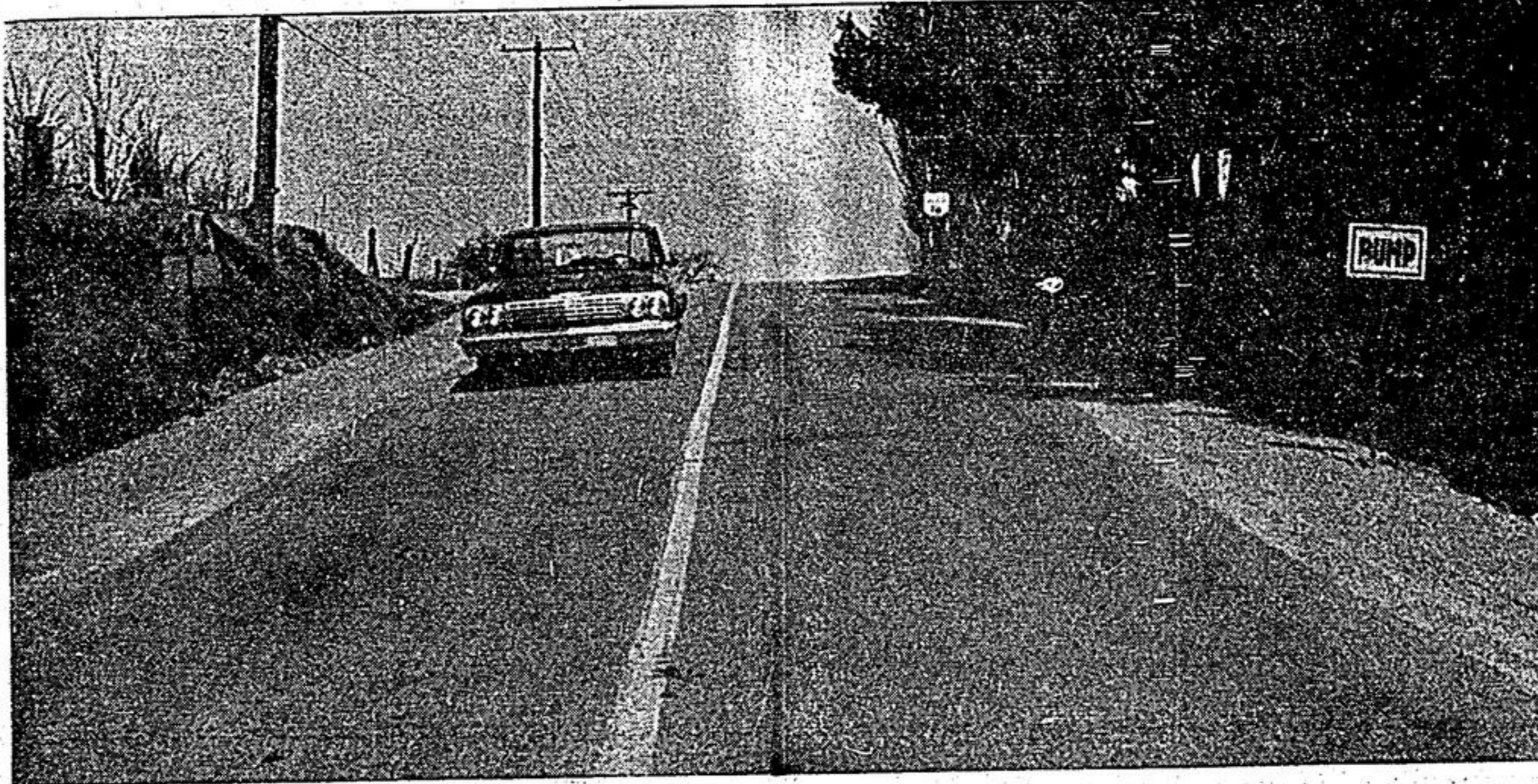

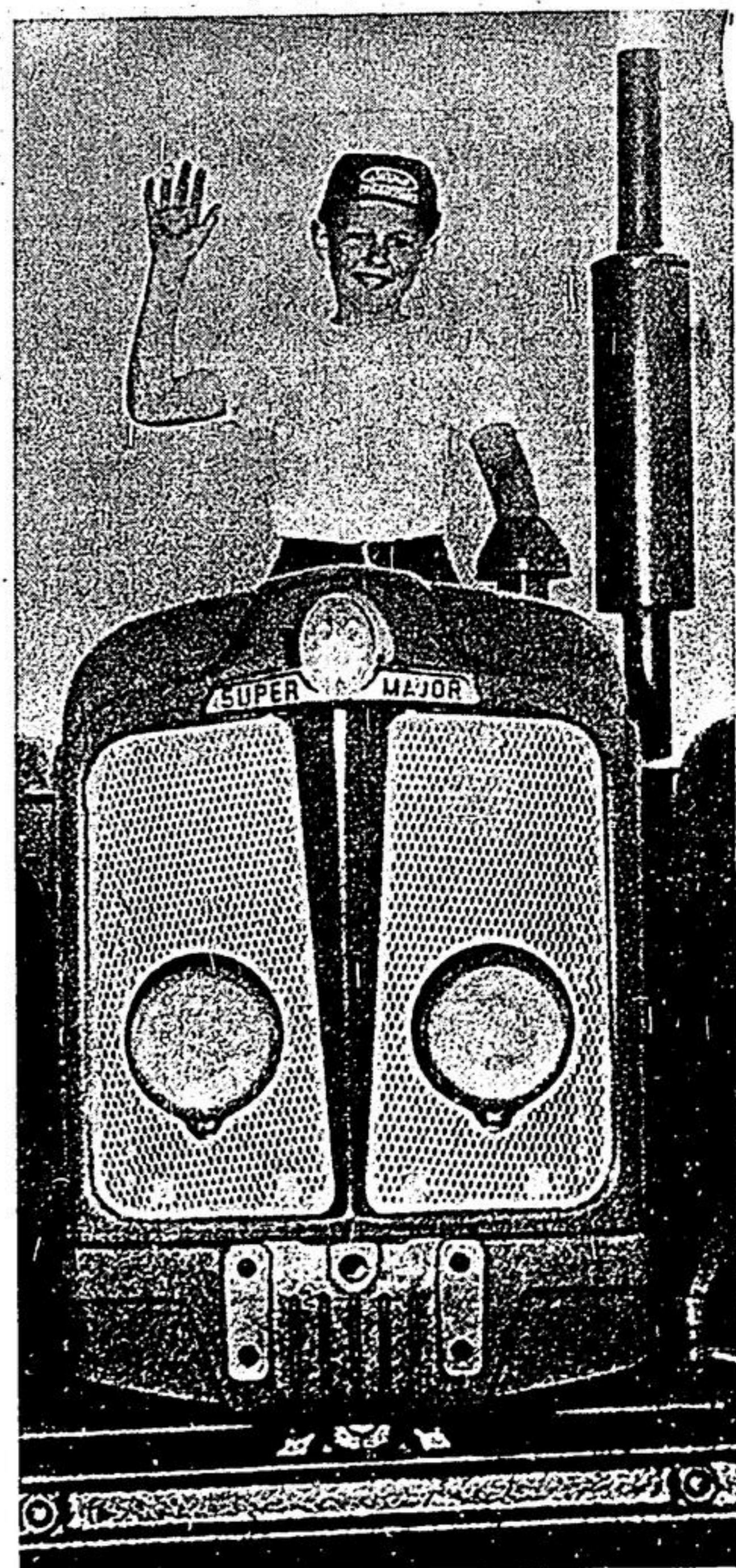
