\$140 A Couple Is Minimum More By Choice, And Sooner

This is a major plank in the Liberal Party's national platform: The new national minimum retirement pension under a Liberal government, will be \$75. a month for single retired persons at the age of 70 and \$140 for married couples. This is a minimum and it will be paid to people 70 or over who have not had an opportunity of contributing under the proposed contributory plan.

Those who wish to participate in a new Liberal contributory plan, which becomes effective over a period, can have their pensions begin at 65. The size of the pensions under this phase of the plan rises year by year.

Liberal governments originally introduced the universal old-age pension and, in cooperation with the provinces, made it available to people between 65 and 70 who are in need.

Many private companies now have good pension schemes, but a majority of the Canadian working population is not covered by them. Thus, a government contributory scheme, along with the regular basic pension of \$75. per person paid by the federal government, becomes of great national value to all who work for a living.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture has appealed to the Canadian Federation to press the Dept. of Trade and Commerce to place eggs on the list of commodities for which import permits are required.

- 5. Take up each pig and immediately tie and clip navel cord, at about 2 inches, and paint with a 50-50 iodine and glycerine mixture.
- 6. Wipe away slimy mucus from nose


and mouth. Put in brooder or under heat lamp.

7. Clip needle teeth, using sharp clippers, to prevent pigs from injuring each other and sow's udder.

8. After teeth are clipped, paint gums with iodine-glycerine mixture. If ears are notched, also paint with iodineglycerine mixture.
