**\$140 A Couple Is Minimum More By Choice, And Sooner**

This is a major plank in the Liberal Party's national platform: The new national minimum retirement pension under a Liberal government, will be \$75. a month for single retired persons at the age of 70 and \$140 for married couples. This is a minimum and it will be paid to people 70 or over who have not had an opportunity of contributing under the proposed contributory plan.

**Increase in Turkey Thefts Concerns Fed. Of Agriculture**

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture has indicated its concern over the increased number of turkey thefts in the Province. At a meeting in Toronto recently, the members approved the passing of a resolution that would urge the Attorney General to approve of stiffer penalties for those convicted of such offenses.

**No Egg Shortages**

The recent importation of eggs from Poland into Ontario has caused egg producers some concern. It was pointed out that the imported products arrived at a time when there was no local shortage. The Ontario Federation of Agriculture has appealed to the Canadian Federation to press the Dept. of Trade and Commerce to place eggs on the list of commodities for which import permits are required.

**Disaster Fund**

Another resolution proposed the establishment of a Disaster Fund by the Ont. Department of Agriculture to assist farmers who suffered severe livestock losses due to disease not covered by the Health and Animals compensation regulations. It was proposed that such a fund would either compensate the farmer affected or provide interest free loans to enable them to become re-established.

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**TIPS ON HOW TO SAVE MORE PIGS AT FARROWING TIME**
