The roof had been cut off, it had no windshield, no headlights, no hood, no spare tire, no brakes, two home-made front fenders and one improvised hub cap. The door on the passenger side would not open. Hicks had come to the Markham station to seek information on a "causing disturbance" charge laid earlier by Richmond Hill police.

He is scheduled to appear in Richmond Hill court to face the Markham charge on June 8th.


### Local P.C. To Act For E.M.O.

Markham Township Council has, given every indication it will not be stampeded into approving of a large sub-division on the northwest corner of Unionville which has been under discussion for several years.

J. Grant, representing Fallden Investments, appeared before council again on Tuesday requesting approval of the plans. He said they were the fourth company to take on this development and they did not intend to fail.

The company was prepared to build a disposal plant and install a sewerage system complete with storm sewers. The present village of Unionville could tap into the sewers but would be required to place the mains and connections to the houses at the expense of the present owners. In return for building the sewer system, the company was asking the town-

# Council Hears Board Recommendation For New Stouffville Library Building

Stouffville municipal council will give consideration to the erection of a new public library building. A deputation from the Public Library Board, Rev. Douglas Davis, Miss Anne Lehman, Geo. Foord, Elmer Daniels and Harry Bourne, appeared before council on Thursday evening, to point out the necessity for such a move.

Speaking for the deputation, Rev. Douglas Davis stated that the Board felt it was necessary to secure new premises as the present library building was of insufficient size and there was no land on which any additions could be made to the structure.

The present library building was completed in 1923 with the Carnegie Foundation, which contributed millions to libraries throughout the province, paying \$5,000 plus half of the additional cost of correct three than a ditional cost of correct three ditional cost of some three thousand dollars. The cost of the lot, approximately \$600, was paid by public subscription.

Mr. Foord stated it was useless for the Board to request increased grants to purchase books as they had no place to display them. The downstairs basement was of little use as the stairs was very narrow and it was necessary to pass the furnace to get into the inner room. He gave council some figures on the present use of the library and said that the Board was providing about 600 new books in a year. The present percapita grant is 50c which was about the lowest in the province. The Library Inspector when he visited the local institution recently, had made certain recommendations concerning the building and stated that grant should be about \$2 per
