U. S. Recognizes Ontario Farm Safety Program

Effectiveness of the Ontario Farm Safety program, set up by the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, has been recognized by the U. S. Government, which recently asked Grant Smith, past Chairman of the Ontario Farm Safety Council, to participate in the Washington conference called by the U. S. Occupational Safety Conference.

Establishment of the Ontario Farm Safety Council followed a farm accident survey in Ontario which pointed up the heavy loss of life and economic loss resulting from farm operations.

Mr. Smith participated in a program devoted to Safer American Agriculture and was able to outline to the U. S. conference the effectiveness of the Ontario program.

One of the conclusions drawn by the conference was that education provided the major key to the reduction of farm accidents and that an educational program is necessary to inform farm residents and employees of the dangers inherent in the industry.

Recommendations for educating U. S. farm people were similar to those now being carried out in Ontario.

TIME FOR REPOTTING HOUSE PLANTS
 This is the best time of the year for repotting house plants, say horticulturists. If your houseplants are too large for their present containers, or the soil is "sour" or otherwise worn out, here are a few suggestions for their care.

When moving a plant to a larger pot, it needs coarser and richer soil than would be used for cuttings or seedlings. Carefully dump out the plant, holding your fingers over the soil to keep the plant from falling. Take out the old drainage pieces and some of the old soil from the top of the plant, then add your new soil on all sides of the plant, firming it with your fingers. Tapping the pot on the bench will help the soil to settle.

If your plant has become waterlogged, a good procedure is to shake it and wash it in water when you have removed it from the pot. Choose a pot that is just large enough to hold the root system nicely, using a sandy soil that is low in nutrients. Water carefully until the plant has recovered, then report in a better soil.
