

#### TIME FOR REPOTTING HOUSE PLANTS

This is the best time of the year for repotting house plants, say horticulturists. If yours have grown too large for their present containers, or the soil is "sour" or otherwise worn out, here are a few suggestions for their care. When moving a plant to a

larger pot, it needs coarser and richer soil than would be used for cuttings or seedlings. Carefully dump out the plant, holding your fingers over the soil to keep the plant from falling. Take out the old drainage pieces and some of the old soil from the top of the plant, then add your new soil on all sides of the plant, firming it with your fingers. Tapping the pot on the bench will help the soil to set-

If your plant has become waterlogged, a good procedure is to shake it and wash it in water when you have removed it from the pot. Choose a pot that is just large enough to hold the root system nicely, using a sandy soil that is low in nutrients. Water carefully until the plant has recovered, then repot in a better soil
