Definite dates and areas of administration shall appear in the local newspapers and on radio and television programmes prior to these clinics.

## Cedar Grove News

Further to the investigation into the pros and cons of joining or forming an area, a meeting was held Wednesday night in the school with the Public School Inspector present to answer questions.

Before the meeting got underway a misunderstanding arose as to whether or not these investigative evenings were official school meetings. John Petrie, who originated the motion for Wednesday's meeting, clarified the point by stating that "this was not (his) intention". These gatherings were intended to bring to all interested a knowledge of our present and future educational problems and the possible ways of solving them.

With Walter Burkholder in the chair, the inspector dealt with questions from the floor covering taxation, permanency of area decisions, irregular tax rates, council's prerogative, board's authorities and various alternatives for answering our particular school needs.

Mr. Hallman stated that it is possible, if complicated, for Council to break the agreement and rearrange boundaries if evidence of its failure or dissatisfaction warrants a change, and that although ratepayers actually "have no right to vote" their preference in a school administration system, council does like an indication of feelings in a school section before reaching a decision.

Mr. Hallman felt that the advantages of having one subject per teacher was compensation for the considerable moving about of pupils within an area. The Lee Avenue school, which it is hoped, will be open this fall, will comprise three classrooms and an all-purpose room.

Some ratepayers felt that the actual issue of joining Area No. 2 should be put to a vote at once while others felt that the board should have more time to continue their considerations of all possible combinations before a commitment was finally made. However, the board of SS 20 was reluctant to bring this before their ratepayers until Locust Hill board had had an opportunity to discuss it among themselves. Albert Drudge, the chairman of Locust Hill Board, was able to state that the proposal may be well received by his ratepayers and, since they have no wish to join a large area, this plan could prove favourable.

Before the meeting closed, the following motion was made: That the Board arrange a formal Ratepayers Meeting when it is ready to give a final report on its research, (before May, 1963) — to permit sufficient time for council to act before July 1st. Carried.
