Hold Liberal Rally Here on June 5th

The Masonic Hall, Stouffville, will be the scene of a Liberal Rally on Tuesday evening, June 5th at eight o'clock.

The guest speaker will be Mr. John Addison, Liberal Party candidate in York North.

On Thursday night in Markham, close to fifty persons greeted Mr. Addison at a gathering in the Veterans' Hall.

"I don't think we have ever seen a campaign carried out in this riding such as has been promoted by Mr. Addison," said Mr. Donald Deacon of Unionville, who introduced the candidate.

Mr. Addison charged that Canada's economic system had crumbled and fallen apart under the Conservative leadership "and there is every indication that the government is not far behind," he said. "All across the country there is a great swing to the Liberal Party," he continued.

Mr. Addison charged that the Conservatives had closed their eyes to the unemployment problem. "We cannot afford to keep this anchor around our necks," he said. He pointed out that Canada's national debt had climbed to three million dollars in five years of Conservative reign. "I don't suggest that the Liberal Party can straighten things out overnight," he continued. "When the nation's business had been run as badly as it has in the last five years, it will take time to correct it."

"Each time the Liberal government has come into power, the country has moved ahead," he said. "If I am elected, I will guarantee that I will give more than six speeches in five years in the House of Commons," he concluded.

Complaints re Dumping Of Leather Co. Refuse

The dumping of sludge by the Collis Leather Co. of Aurora at Buchanan's Dump on the 2nd concession, was once more on the agenda of Whitchurch Twp. council Monday. This matter has been up for discussion many times over the last few years.

R. Preston Leggett who purchased a farm in that area, submitted a petition signed by 26 residents and a letter requesting council take some action or they would appeal for action through the courts.

Mr. Leggett stated the odor from the adjoining dump made life almost unbearable. He suggested that the sludge entering the ground might eventually destroy the water supply.

Council members expressed surprise that the dumping had increased, and it was thought four truck loads a day was the limit. Mr. Leggett stated that the number was not less than eight a day.

On this information, council agreed that the officials of the company should be contacted and a meeting arranged with a view to having the dumping in Whitchurch discontinued.

Sunday School Lesson

GOLDEN TEXT: Let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth.—1 John 3: 18.

The Lesson as a Whole

While Paul was the apostle of faith, and Peter the messenger of hope, John was the apostle of love. Paul's ministry emphasized the church, and Peter's the Kingdom. But John's letters are directed to God's "family".

In keeping with this family emphasis, John uses a beautiful term that distinguishes Christianity, and makes it unique. It is the word "fellowship." This means a sharing together, a communion, and indicates a common life. Just as natural children share the life and manifest the nature of their parents, so do the children of God manifest the spiritual life and characteristics of their Heavenly Father. And, according to John, the essential marks of this life are righteousness and love.

The Heart of the Lesson

In a world that has expressed its hatred for God in the utter repudiation of His Son, there is a unique fellowship of love. This fellowship is composed of all those who have been reconciled to God, and who, because of that reconciliation, possess His very life. And they have not only His life but they have also His Holy Spirit, who is the power of that nature.

This fellowship is within a spiritual family. Because God their Father is light, they practice righteousness and hate iniquity. Because He is love, they love both the God who has begotten them, and also all their spiritual brethren.

These two traits are illustrated in John's Second and Third Epistles. These two letters complement each other. In the former we are warned against receiving deceivers, while in the latter we are urged to receive and support fellow workers in the truth. The Second Epistle commands us to keep the door of our homes closed; the Third encourages us to keep it open. Thus we are admonished to discriminate between foes and friends, wolves and sheep.

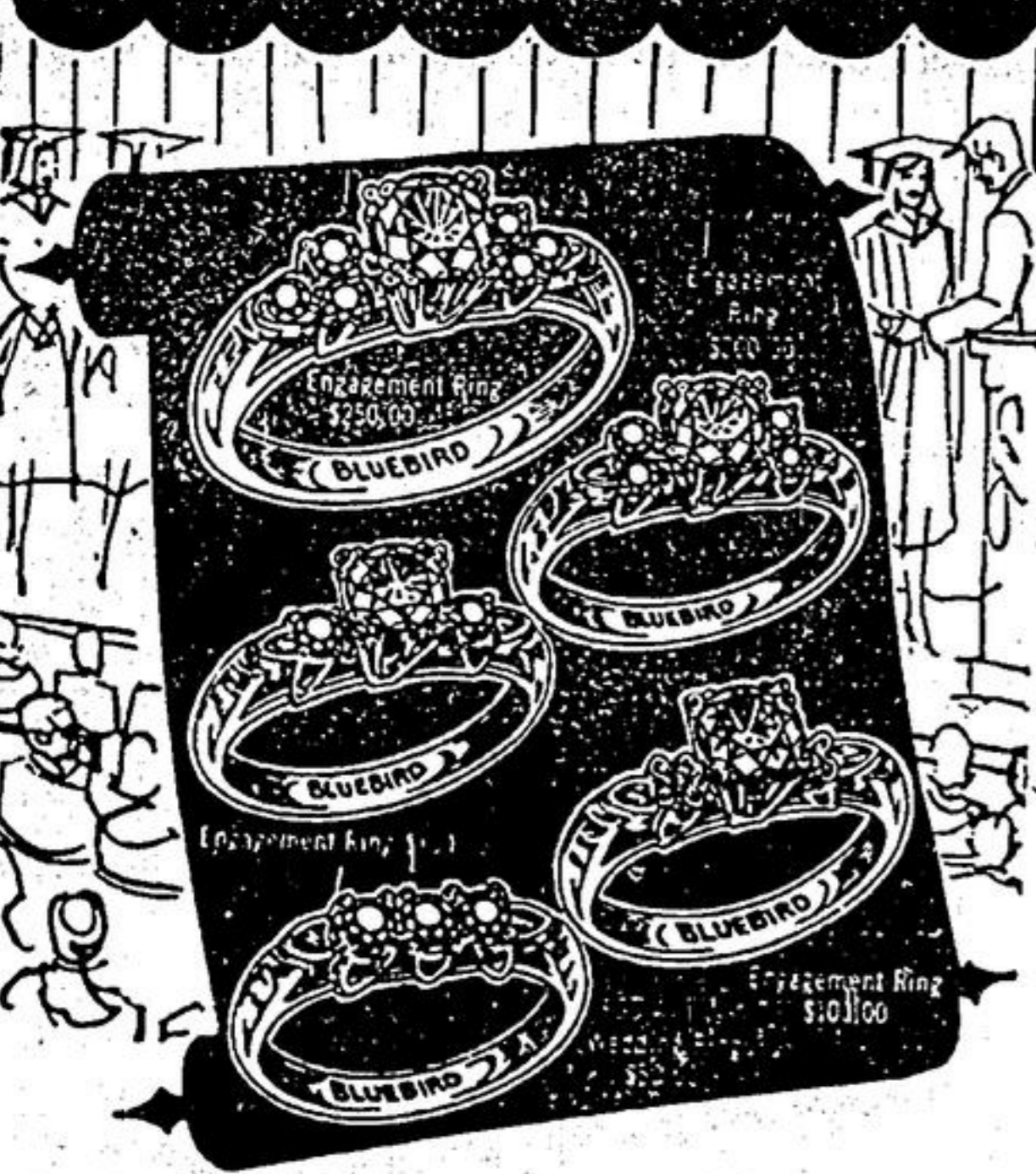
