Miss Fierheller won a close decision over the three other contestants, Miss Margaret Broadbelt of Mt. Albert, who was declared runner-up; Miss Margaret Cook of Armitage and Miss Mary Naylor of R.R. 1, Maple. The judges emphasized that the decision was extremely close and complimented all of the girls on their

efforts. A large crowd of spectators was on hand to view the competition which was sponsored by the dairy producers of York County in conjunction with the York County Federation of Agriculture.

Each of the four contestants was required to milk a cow and give a short talk on the dairy industry in York County. They were judged according to their milking ability, personality, and their self expression.

Miss Fierheller now goes on to represent York County in the Ontario Dairy Princess Competition which is held nightly at the C.N.E. in the Coliseum, with

the finals being held on August 30th. The winner of the Ontario Competition will win a flight to Britain and will represent Ontario in the Canadian Dairy Princess Competition held in 1963.

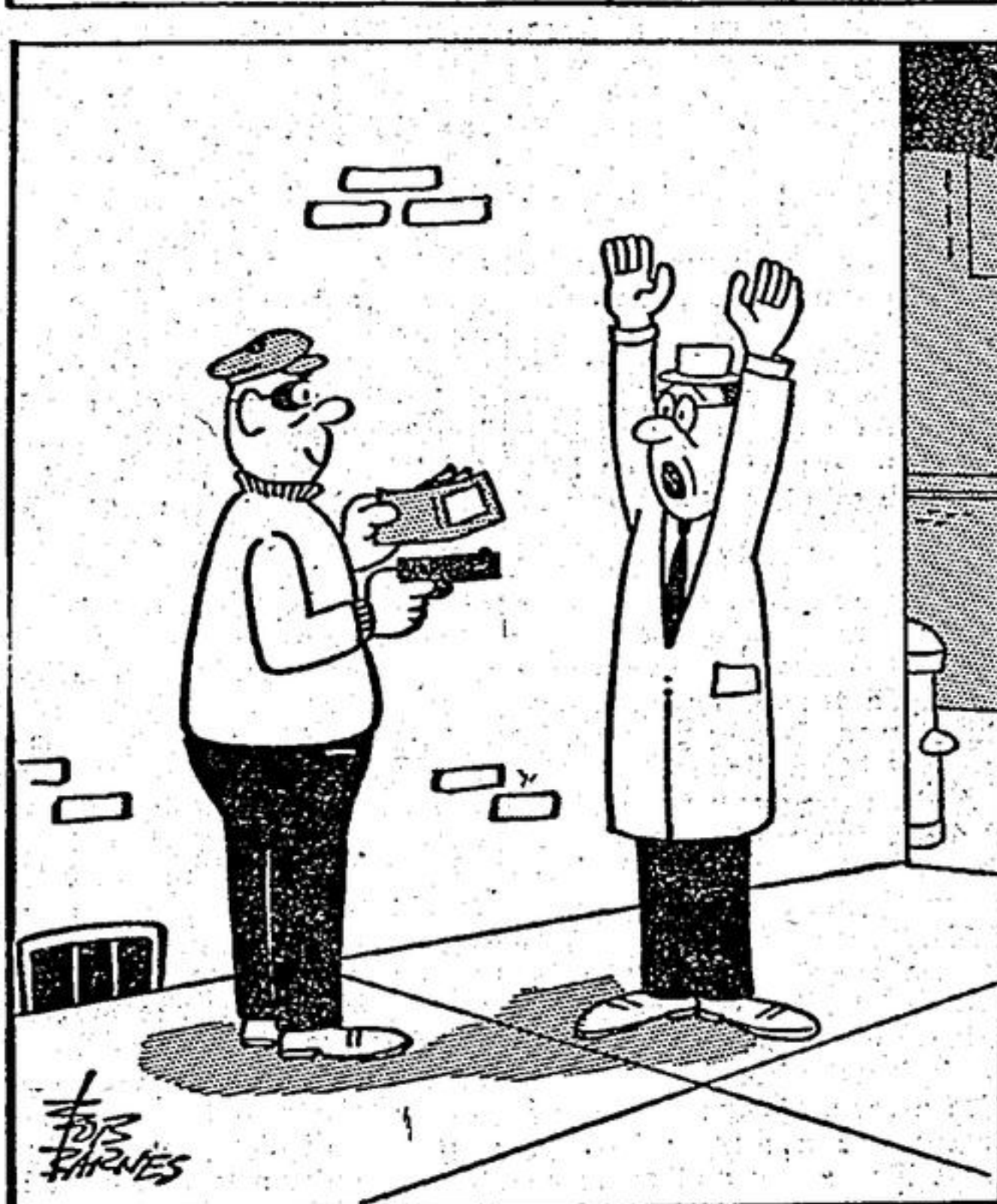
Mr. and Mrs. Don Pegg and baby visited with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Brooks, on the weekend.

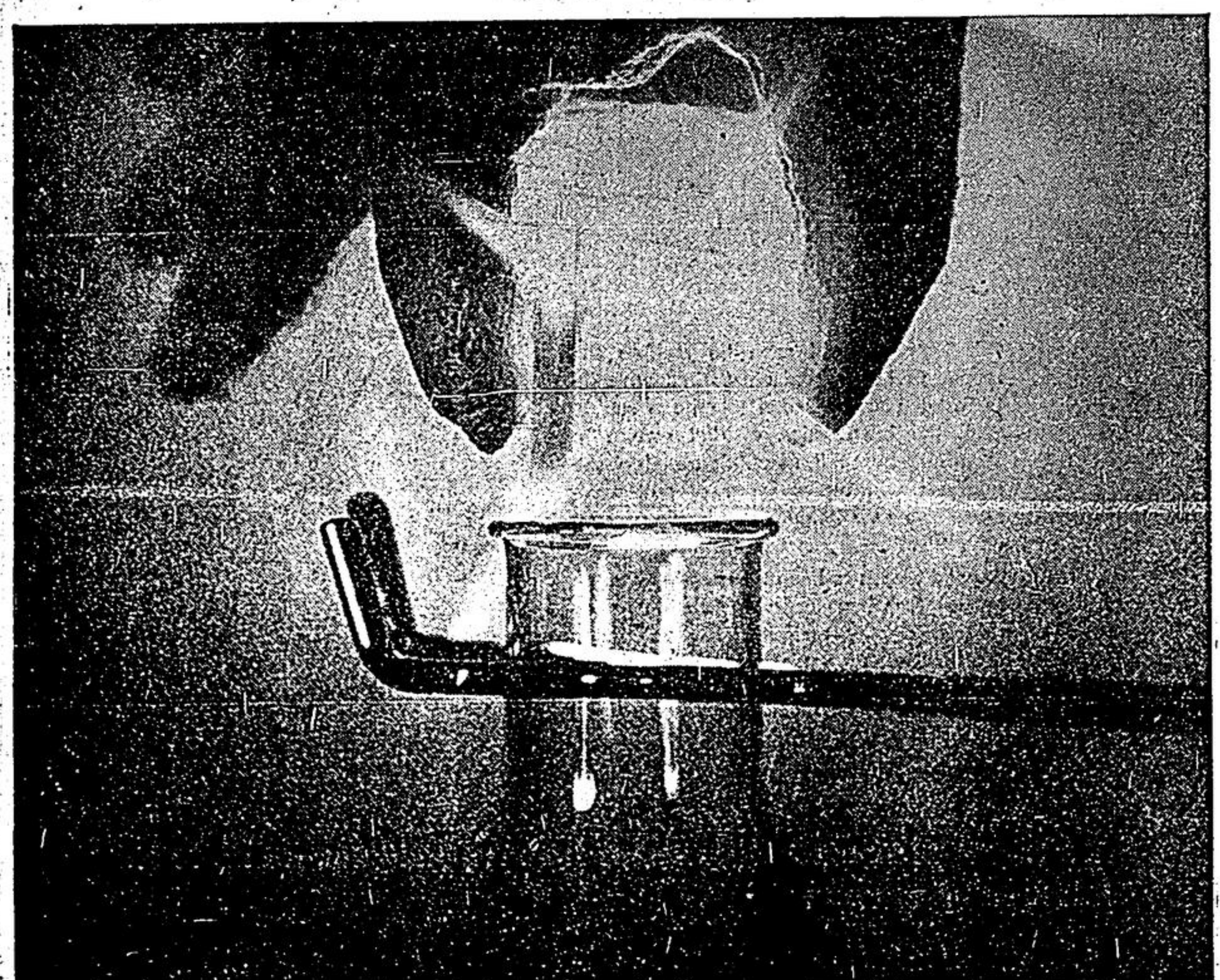

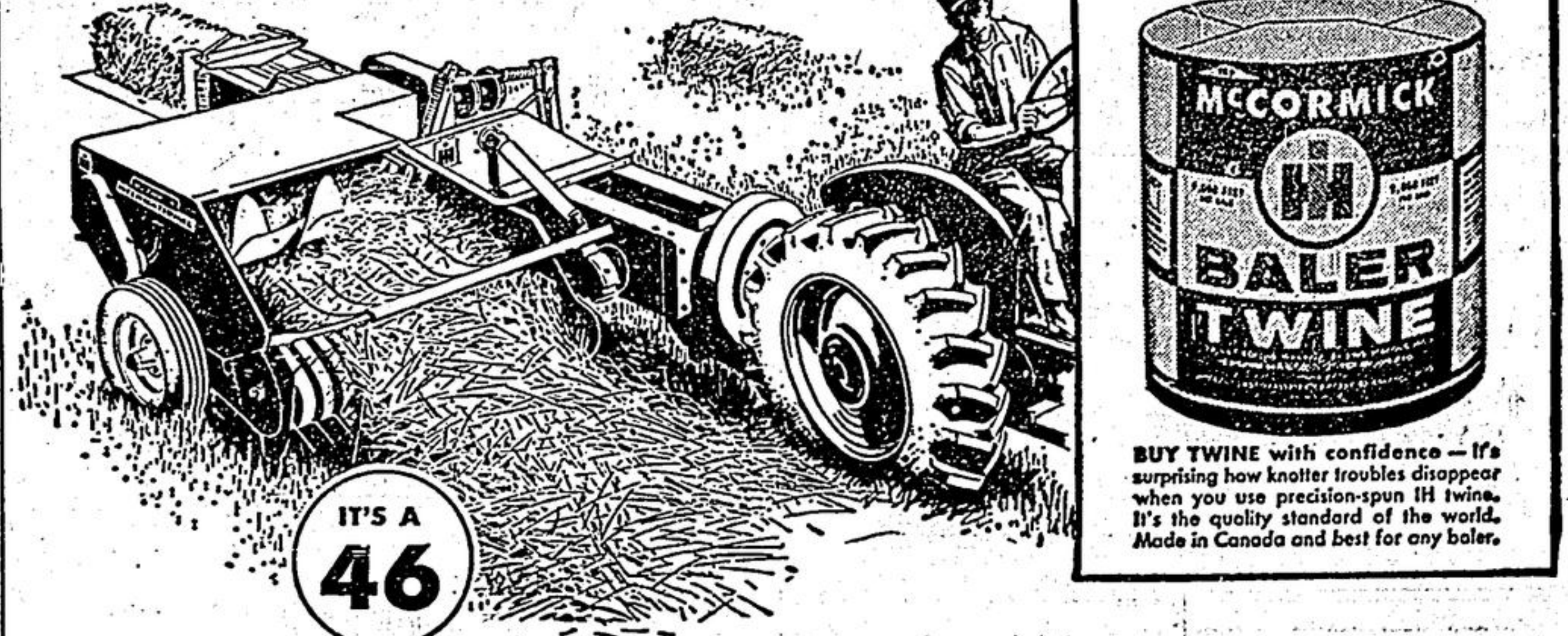
