A Brock Road resident, Mr. T. J. Wheeler has urged that the County should adopt a tree-planting program on the Brock Road between Highway 2 and Conc. 4 in the Twp. of Pickering. Written recommendations were filed with the township council at a regular meeting on Monday night.

The tree demolition work was done by the County during its current road construction project.

"I have never seen so much havoc created with trees as on Brock Road," observed Reeve Sherman Scott.

Councillor Milton Mowbray noted that many of the trees that had been destroyed would be from 70 to 90 years old.

"Too often workmen don't realize how long it takes to replace them," commented councillor, Harvey Spang.

Operating Sun. Dances, Fined

A charge of operating a place of amusement and entertainment, laid by Pickering Twp. Police Department under a section of the Lord's Day Act was upheld by Magistrate C. W. Guest in Whitby Court last week.

Frank and Robert Hibbert of Dunbarton were fined \$10 or five days in jail. They were alleged to have held a dance at Grand Valley Park in Pickering Township on Sunday, March 18th for which they charged a 75c admission fee.

On May 1st, the case was aired before Magistrate H. R. Howitt who reserved judgment. Evidence was presented by Police Chief, Reg. Parker.

At the trial, Defence Counsel, Gordon Weinstein argued that the wording of the section defining the Lord's Day was ambiguous.

Pickering Firm to Enlarge Co. Building

A space-doubling expansion for H.G. Designs Ltd., Station Road, Pickering, will result in the opening of a new shipping and stocking building in mid-June, the company said this week.

The 5,500 square foot concrete block building will house modern shipping and stocking equipment for the firm's products — Nylol-Slide sashless windows and custom-designed kitchens.

Kenneth C. Hisey, Vice-President of H.G. Designs Ltd., said the new building represents the first major expansion of facilities for the 3 1/2-year-old firm.

Now near completion, the building will allow for more manufacturing area in the original section of the factory.

"At the same time, our new shipping building will mean faster truck loading, and, of course, better service for our customers across Ontario," he pointed out.

The building features overhead doors at the loading bay, a levelling bed equalizer for different truck heights, and overhead temperature control units. The use of long-span steel joists, eliminating floor-to-ceiling posts allows complete freedom of operation.

Object to Road Name For Private Interests

A suggestion that a sideline road between lots 14 and 15 conc. 6, Pickering, be named "Cherry Downs Road" to better identify a new 200 acre golf course at lots 13 and 14, conc. 7, was shelved by Council at a regular meeting on Monday night.

The property was the former Gordon Hodgson premises. Mr. W. K. Cherry is one of the present owners.

"I wonder what we are getting into by naming roads after commercial enterprises," questioned councillor Milton Mowbray. "It might well amount to a very embarrassing precedent at some later date."

"Everyone who owns or operates a park could request the same thing," stated Reeve, Sherman Scott.

Councillor Mowbray said he was not particularly concerned with the request from Mr. Cherry but contended that such a policy could have far-reaching effects.

Deputy-Reeve, Mrs. Jean McPherson argued that names, rather than numbers, would better identify the location of roads in particular areas. She pin-pointed the various arteries across the municipality including the Altona Road, White's Road, Valley Farm Road, Brock Road, Westney Road, Audley Road, etc.

"It's a policy problem," noted the Reeve. "If we start, where do we stop?"
