WILL THE BUBBLE BREAK?

How long will Goodwood last as the top-notch entry in the Claremont Community softball circuit? With seven games and seven victories tucked safely under their belts, this entry has, to date, been the feature of current schedule play.

The first few wins were not taken as any serious indication of Goodwood's prominence, either at the bat or in the field. Some of their rivals are now admitting, after tasting a couple of defeats, that they are not fac-

ing a bunch of grade-school kids.

As we write this (June 14) Goodwood has won seven games in a row. We feel sure that they can and will be beaten. We would even suggest that they will be knocked out of the top spot before the end of the regular schedule. We would base this opinion on a mound staff that is carried mainly by righthander, Ken May. We would not take anything away from his prowess as a pitcher but one of these nights, his fielding mates are bound to turn in only an "average" defensive display and their win streak will end.

This Goodwood club is the best thing that could have happened to the league. In the contests we have seen, their wizardry on the diamond has been nothing short of sensational. Line drive catches, double plays, base-stealing, you name it and they do it.

If the May brothers can continue their creditable control over rival batsmen, the team should be a cinch for at least a runners-up position at playoff time. Right now, they are performing like champions.

MUST KEEP THE KIDS COMING

If any town, village or hamlet hopes to keep its name in the spotlight of adult sports competitions, it must promote some type of systematic minor league program that will keep the "kids" climbing up the ladder to replace the oldsters when they decide the time has come to hang 'em up.

Veteran athletes just don't go on and on and on. When the day of retirement comes, there must be new blood to fill the gaps. If the reserves are not available,

the entry will rapidly peter out. Take a look at Claremont in the community softball league. Once the most-feared club in the circuit. Once the group's biggest crowd attraction. Today, the team is gone. Claremont now has an active minor organization in the Pickering Twp. softball league, but you don't produce a Beverley, a Ward, an Allman, a Pascoe or a Redshaw overnight. Claremont's minor program would appear to be a little late to fill the holes in the Intermediate ranks. We would hope, however, that through a concentrated effort, the Claremont nameplate may once again be returned to the field of adult sports' prom-


