137th Annual Session Of Christian Church

On Wednesday evening, June 15, members of the Conference of the Christian Church in Ontario gathered in the Ringwood Church for the opening devotions of this year's sessions. Rev. H. H. Kent, pastor of Emmanuel Christian Church, Toronto, using as his text 1 Chron. 4:10, "Oh that thou wouldst bless me indeed, and enlarge my coast, and that thine hand might be with me, and that thou wouldst keep me from evil, that it may not grieve me!" encouraged each member and church to "enlarge our borders." We must ask that the hand of God might guide and control our lives, that He might keep us from evil, and pour out His blessing upon us. If we make this request in all sincerity, God will hear and answer.

During the business sessions on Thursday and Friday reports showed that each church had been faithful in missionary givings, in Sunday School work, and in many evangelistic efforts to reach out in their respective districts.

On Thursday afternoon and again in the evening, Rev. A. Rees, of Markham and Dickson Hill appealed to the delegates that they might identify themselves with Christ in every aspect of their daily Christian walk—thus being assured of victory through the ascended power of Christ.

A very solemn ceremony was witnessed on Friday afternoon when two local ministers, Clarence T. Bass of Stouffville Memorial Church, and A. Barry Jones of Ringwood Church, were accorded the rites of ordination with Rev. W. W. Serrick, Rev. H. H. Kent and Rev. D. C. Percy officiating. Following this service, the newly-ordained ministers served the bread and wine as clergy and congregation observed Holy Communion.

The Friday evening session was under the leadership of the Women's Missionary Society, with Dr. and Mrs. Tom Belch of Emmanuel Church, who are preparing to return to West Pakistan told of their plans, and of the work to which they are returning in Bach Hospital where they hope to reach many Moslems through their medical work there.

At the closing session on Sunday evening, Rev. Wm. Cump, of Toronto Bible College, admonished the crowd present to follow the example of the Apostle Paul in his endeavour to obey the heavenly vision presented to him. Although Paul had beyond circumstances hefted appeared to be the victim, looking beyond present circumstances he saw victory in Christ. Likewise, if we are to be victorious in our Christian work, we must look beyond circumstances and difficulties and be 'not disobedient to the heavenly vision'.

Councillor Spang said he had asked about cross-walks before but was told the highway had not yet been taken over by the town.

"I'd propose that this letter be turned over to the police committee for their recommendation," said Reeve Timbers.

"I've watched our crossings particularly and never yet seen a close call, but if they were cross-walks, people would step out as if they had the right-of-way," said deputy-reeve Laushway.

Matter Left in the Air
From cross-walks the discussion swung back to the safety program. Reeve Timbers said the program is actually backed by the Department of Transport and is sponsored by a constable who is an interested citizen, along with others.

"I approve of the program but I'd like to see the Sr. Officer brought into it," said Councillor Spang.

"I'm not opposed to safety, but as a council we should know how it's to be handled," said councillor Parsons.

At this juncture Constable Heatherington rose and declared that, "I'm going to turn the whole program over to the Sr. Officer, and I wish him luck. I've given out over a thousand safety pamphlets and this is the first time the program has been questioned," declared the Constable, and left the meeting.
