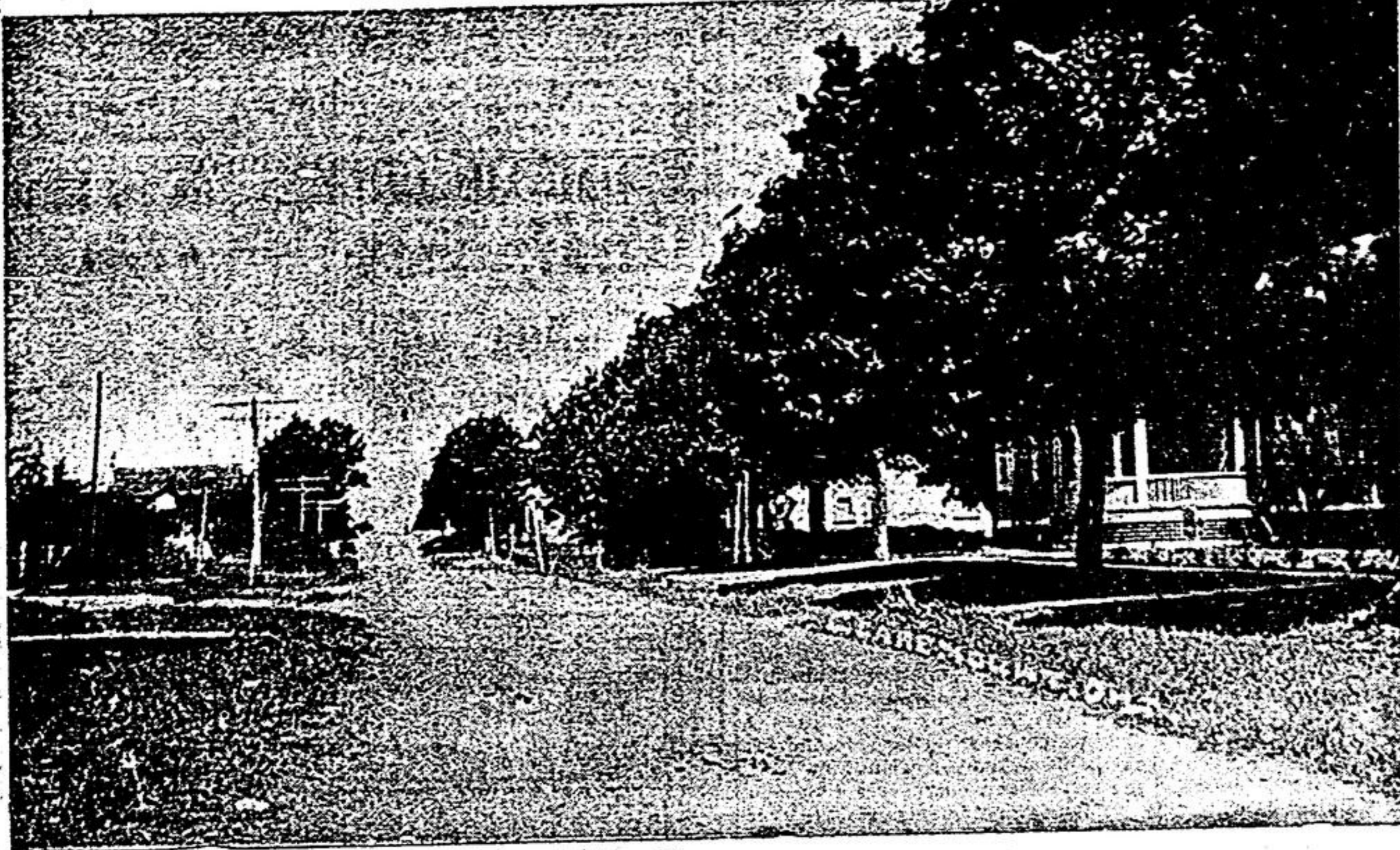

Charges Twp. Flouted Offer For Fill

Andrew Dand of West Rouge, appearing before Pickering Township council at a special meeting last Thursday night, charged that a promise to give him all the fill he wanted, from the sewer excavating in his area was not kept.

Mr. Dand told council that for the past several years he has been considering putting up a rink for the community on his property, the Rouge Hill Golf and Country Club.

"I asked Mr. Chapman about getting fill on June 6. I got a few leads, and the next day they were back dumping it in a dump. Then they started to dump it in the school yard. That school yard has so much fill in it, it is coming out its ears," Mr. Dand said.

"He told council that if the fill on the school yard, eroded onto his property, he would take legal action. Mr. Dand charged discrimination in the matter of his getting the fill.

"We have a policy now, that all ratepayers pay \$1.00 a load for fill," said Reeve Sherman Scott.

"My dear Mr. Scott," countered Mr. Dand, "this promise to me was made 10 days before your new policy was set up. I am well aware of the new policy and have no argument with it."

"Sometimes people make promises who can't keep them," said the Reeve.

"I wouldn't give Pickering Township a five-cent piece for a load of fill and I need 300 to 500 loads," said Mr. Dand.

Altona Plumber Refused License Without Test

Mr. Fletcher Goudie, of R.R. 3, Stouffville, was refused a plumbing license without passing a plumber's examination, at a special meeting of Pickering Township council on Thursday night.

Mr. Goudie, who has been in the plumbing business for nearly 40 years, claimed he did not know about the special bylaw that was passed by council requiring all plumbers in the area to take a test. Some township plumbers were notified and notices were put in four local papers. The advertisement said that if local plumbers applied for their license before a certain date, they would not have to take the examination.

"If I had known about this, I would have been down and got a license," Mr. Goudie told council. "I have plenty of work outside the area, but I would still like a license here."

Councillor Harvey Spang said, "I thought all the plumbers were to be notified; and that was why the bylaw was held up."

Clerk L. T. Johnston said he was under the impression Mr. Goudie had moved into Stouffville.

Mr. Goudie said he was not making any threats to council but inferred he could make a few uncomplimentary remarks about the township's plumbing inspection department.

Trio Fined \$150 For Fishing On Second Sanctuary In Uxbridge Twp.

A trio whose fishing expedition took them into a bird sanctuary to trout spawning beds were each fined \$50 and costs in Whitby police court last week. S. Kostjuk, of Oshawa, Don Bois, 16, and Everet Vraegh, 23, both of Ajax, were convicted of trespassing on the bird sanctuary owned by Toronto veterinarian Dr. Alan Secord, located near Goodwood.

Dr. Secord told the court that he owned 288 acres on the 3rd concession of Uxbridge Township, south of Goodwood and operated it as a sanctuary for wildfowl. In addition, he said, there are several ponds on the farm where Kamloops and speckled trout spawn.

He said that neither hunting nor fishing is permitted and the property is well posted with No Trespassing signs.

Trout Spawning — On May 6, when the three accused were found on his property, he said, the Kamloops trout were spawning and were most easy to catch. The entire property, he said, is fenced in. Ivan Norton, whose property adjoins the Secord farm, said

Claremont Girl To Study French At Swiss College

On Tuesday, July 3rd, 17 year old Betty Ward, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ken Ward, Claremont, will leave Malton by air, en route to Switzerland where she will enroll in a Swiss College for a five week course this summer. She will specialize in French.

Betty, a grade 11 student at the Pickering Dist. High School, will be one of 62 other young men and women who will make the trip. The group comprises 34 girls and 28 boys. Only one of this number is from the United States. The remainder are from Canada.

In addition to the five-week study course, Betty will enjoy a tour to points of interest in Europe including stop-overs in Amsterdam, Holland; Germany, France, Italy and Switzerland. Prior to her return home, she will visit London. Her flight will depart, however, from Amsterdam on Aug. 30th.

Betty first learned of the overseas course and tour from a school newspaper. "I never thought it could happen to me," she said. She wrote for further information on the subject. Her application was accepted when she was able to comply with all test requirements. She is the first Claremont girl to enroll.



Unlicensed Dance Hall Brings Fine of \$50

Frank Hibbert, 49, of Dunbarton, proprietor of the Grand Valley Park, was fined \$50 and costs last week for using a public hall as a place of public assembly without a licence. Hibbert, who appeared before Magistrate C. W. Guest in Whitby police court, said he had obtained the \$5 licence the day after police visited his hall to lay the charge.

Harold Ashton, Pickering Township Bylaw Enforcement Officer, said that Hibbert had been advised on March 15 that he would need a licence to operate the hall which he was building. He said that Hibbert obtained his licence on April 30.

Sgt. John Pugh, of the Pickering Township Police Dept., said that he visited the hall on April 29 and found some 300 persons dancing. He said that the hall contained seating for more than 100 persons. Sgt. Pugh said that Hibbert at that time said that the licence would be obtained as soon as approval came from the Fire Chief.

Hibbert told the court that on April 30, before he received the summons, he had obtained the public hall licence. He said that

"I count it an honour to be asked to take this service," stated Rev. Bruce Hisey, Pastor of Second Markham and Baker Hill Baptist Churches at the funeral for the late Cella Ann Baker at the parlors of McGuire and Low, Uxbridge, on Thursday afternoon. The deceased, the oldest person in the Province at 108 years, would have marked her 109th birthday in September. She passed away in the Brierbush Hospital on Monday morning, June 18th.

"I remember her as a boy -- a very little boy," continued Rev. Hisey. He said that he understood Mrs. Baker had attended the Methodist Church at Bethesda many years ago. He had visited her both at home and following her admission to hospital. "I have never known another person who has lived such a long time," he said.

Mrs. Baker, born at Newmarket, later resided on conc. 6, Whitechurch Twp. She later lived with her daughter, Mrs. Tom Phillips in Uxbridge Twp. "Today, she is present with the Lord," concluded the Pastor.

More than forty persons attended the service in the Uxbridge parlors and later the fifteen car cortege proceeded to the Heise Hill cemetery for burial in a plot next to her late husband, Wm. H. Baker who died in 1926.
