The subdivision has left room for and includes a 5.24 acre school site adjacent to a 6-acre park. Industry has also been provided for. It is hoped, Mr. Grant said, to attract pharmaceutical and medical research organizations to locate in Unionville. This industrial area would be surrounded by park

Another question was, "Would the water supply in any way endanger the wells of the residents?" Mr. Grant answered: "Very little to shallow wells," and produced a Hydrologer's report. However, no satisfactory answer was given by outright statement. It was suggested a little trouble might be incurred.

Unionville now has a chance to move forward. It remains to be seen how the residents will take the proposal, or if they will accept it at all.

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
