Death of Woman in Buttonville Home Discovered After 3 Days

The death of Mrs. Hazel Snowball, Buttonville resident, was discovered last week after the lady had been dead for about four days. Mrs. Snowball, who had raised horses on her Don Mills Road farm, was discovered by Chas. Hooper, a neighbor, when he dropped by to deliver some mail.

It is believed that Mrs. Snowball who had been in poor health passed away in her sleep. She was very fond of pets and had several in the house with her, two Boston terriers, a monkey and some birds. While the animals lacked food, they all had water available to drink.

Mrs. Snowball's mother, Mrs. Darling, who predeceased her last winter, died in a similar manner, and her death was not discovered, either, until some time later.

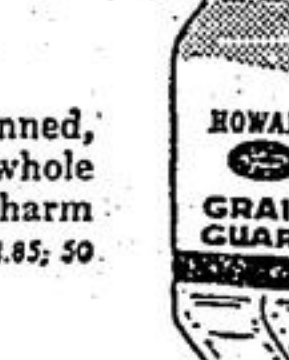
