### Ladies Auxiliary Sponsors Photo Competition

Summer time is picture taking time, and a fact to keep in mind is the photographic contest being sponsored by the Legion Ladies' Auxiliary, for the community and their members. The contest is being launched this week, and will close on Oct. 20th. Judges and prizes will be announced later in the summer.

#### Conditions Of Entry.

1. Only amateur photographers may submit entries. (Definition: Anyone who does not earn a majority of their living from the sale or use of photographic products.) This competition is open to anyone who enjoys taking pictures, whether on a simple box camera, or the latest multi-lensed model. All entries will be judged on appeal and the general interest they arouse, with photographic excellence of secondary importance.

2. All entries must be received on or before Oct. 20th, and must be taken during 1962. The winners will be notified by mail and will also be announced in the Tribune, early in November. A presentation of prizes will be awarded at the Veterans' Memorial Hall on Sat. Nov. 10th, the occasion of the Poppy Fund Bazaar and tea.

3. Prints and slides should be addressed to Legion Ladies Auxiliary Photographic Contest, Box 587, Stouffville. Entries will not be returned unless accompanied by a stamped self-addressed envelope or box. All prints and slides to be clearly marked with the entrant's name and address.

4. There is no limit to the number of prints and slides that can be entered, but no one will be eligible for more than one 1st, 2nd, or 3rd prize. An entry form must accompany each entry. The Ladies' Auxiliary reserves the right to reproduce winning entries for any purpose whatsoever.

5. There will be two divisions, one for black and white prints, and one for colour slides. Colour prints will NOT be accepted. Black and white—no smaller than 4"x5", not more than 10" in the longest dimension. Developing and printing may be done by a photo finisher or by the entrant. Do not mount or retouching permitted on prints. No composite pictures, multiple printing or montages are allowed. Colour Slides—mounting in glass optical. Sizes allowed: 2 1/4 x 3 1/4, 2 1/4 x 2 1/4, super-slides 35 mm.

Categories: Entries are to be made under the following captions and so stated on the entry blank: Black and White; "Young Canada At Play"; "Something Of Interest In Stouffville"; "General Interest"; "Something Of Interest In Stouffville"; "General Interest".

### LIONS PROMOTE TB TESTS THIS WEEK

All persons in Stouffville will be given the opportunity of safeguarding their health by having a free TB test when a community tuberculin test and chest X-ray survey was started on Wednesday July 11th. The survey is promoted by the Stouffville Lions Club and conducted by the National Sanitarium Association.

The announcement was made by Jim Richards who expressed the hope that every resident of Stouffville & Area would take advantage of this opportunity. The unit will be located near Bank of Nova Scotia and will be in operation from 6 P.M. to 9 P.M.

The survey is part of the war on the tuberculosis begun in 1945 by the National Sanitarium Association to find the disease in its early stages.
