Ontario Wheat Price Set At \$1.65 Bushel

This year's minimum price for Ontario winter wheat has been set at \$1.65 a bushel—25 cents higher than the price established for the crop harvested in 1961.

The new price structure was announced following recent negotiations between representatives of the Ontario Wheat Producers Marketing Board and spokesmen for the flour millers, cereal manufacturers and country grain elevator operators.

As in former years the new price agreement has an escalator clause. The minimum price will increase by two cents a bushel each month starting in October—rising to a high of \$1.75 in February 1963.

The escalated price will be held at \$1.75 until next April. Then in May it will drop by five cents, returning to the negotiated minimum of \$1.65 in June.

This year's minimum price will apply to soft wheat Grades 1 and 2. The Grade 3 wheat price has been set at \$1.62. For the first time prices have been established for Eastern Canada Grades 4 and 5 and mixed wheat Grades 1 and 2—wheat in these categories will sell at a minimum of \$1.30 per bushel.
