On Thursday, July 5, the Unionville Community Association met to discuss the proposed sub-division by Tallen Investments Ltd. The meeting was opened by Chairman Wm. Henwood and the minutes were read. Mr. Henwood spoke of the initial concern to the present villagers, taxes, Mr. Henwood summed up the attitude of Tallen Investments Ltd., as he saw it. He prevailed upon those present to come to some attitude or opinion towards the same development in their own minds. This he said was important.

The chairman then turned to the tax question to deal with in more detail. He outlined the general types of tax structure most likely to affect the residents.

A representative, Henwood said, of the Township tax department was asked to be present to answer the questions of the public. When he did not appear, chairman Henwood said he felt "stunned".

It is to be hoped that this action or lack of action is not indicative of the Council's stand in relation to the Association. If there was some valid reason for the meeting being ignored they would be glad to hear of it.

Whether or not it was due to late notice, received less than two hours before the meeting it was hard to determine. The crowd of more than 225 of one week ago dwindled to less than half that number. Other factors possibly causing this depletion in numbers may have been falling interest or disappointment at the aims of the draft constitution drawn up last week.

The Tallen subdivision seems almost certain subject to Council's approval and the debate in ems to have resolved itself into a question of desire to hook up to the new facilities that will be provided when the new sub-division is built.

An undercurrent of muted hostility towards the 400 home sub-division prevailed in a few of the residents. However, the main function of the association chairman Henwood said, was to minimize the tax burden and other hardships arising out of the new development.

A motion was then moved and carried to send a delegation composed of the executive to the next council meeting to inquire why a representative when asked, did not attend the Association's meeting.

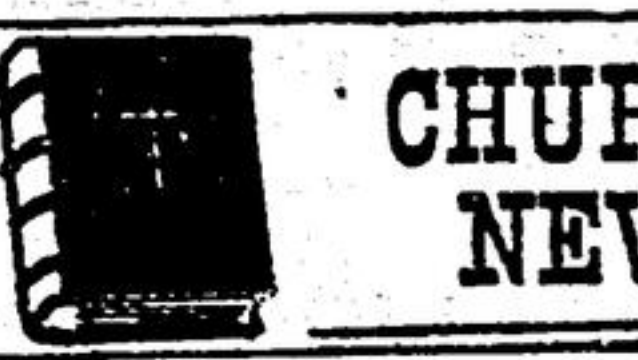
It never takes a tot a long time to learn how to squeeze tooth paste out of the middle of the tube instead of the end.
