Jones, Ellis in Thrilling Mound Duel; "Aces" Beat Mt. Zion 1-0 on Homer

A pitcher's duel between Ron Jones of Mt. Zion and Bob Ellis of Markham that recorded a total of 32 strike-outs in nine innings on Monday night has been termed as one of the top mound efforts ever witnessed in the Brooklin Park.

Only a home run blow by Markham's Bill Johnston separated the teams in the scoring department as the "Aces" gained a tight 1-0 decision.

The versatile Johnston, who can play almost any position on the Markham club, greeted righthander Jones with a circuit clout in the opening inning. From that point on, however, the chunky whirlwind control artist "moved" the Markham men down with a brilliant performance. He was credited with 20 strike-outs while his southpaw rival recorded 12.

Jones whiffed the Markham side in the 1st, 4th, 8th and 9th. Aside from leadoff batman, Johnston, no player advanced further than second base.

Mt. Zion, who are continually plagued by a shortage of plate power, could not cope with the offering of Ellis' "junk" ball. Only second-sacker, Don Ferguson managed to poke a hit through the outfield. The drive, in the 8th inning, spoiled Ellis' valiant try for a no-hit game. Mt. Zion went down in order in the 1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 9th. Each club committed two errors but none of the bobbles effected the score.

Even the most potent Markham batsmen could not solve the wizardry of hurler Jones. Longball chubber, Lawrence Gayman was a strike-out vic-

tim in three out of four trips to the plate. He did scratch out one of the three hits counted by the "Aces" but was left stranded on second base. Bob Atkinson baged a single but was whiffed or two other occasions. Harry Young and Jackie Robinson were each strikeout victims three times.

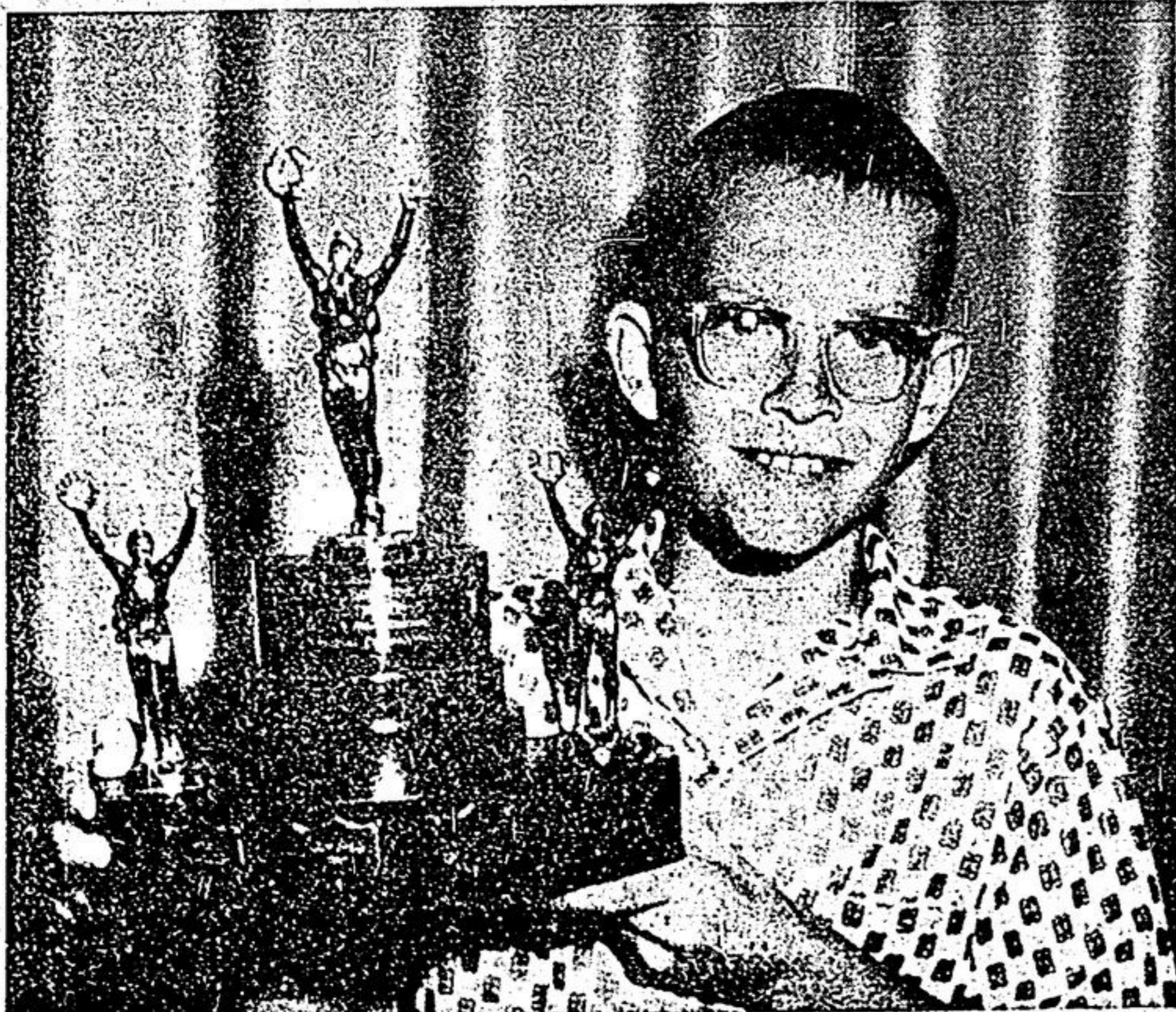

Brougham Park Bd. To Receive \$500

The Pickering Township Park and Recreation Commission has given the Brougham Park Board a grant of \$500 to cover an outstanding deficit and balance their books. This decision was reached at the regular meeting in June on receipt of a request from Messrs. Robt. Miller and Ross Knox.

Mr. Miller, the spokesman said that the Brougham Board had never asked the Recreation Commission for a donation although their funds had been at a low level for the past two years. He explained that only through various campaigns and volunteer work had any projects been completed. The current budget showed a deficit of \$490.00, due mainly to the cost of digging a well. Mr. Miller said that one floodlight pole was in a precarious condition and the electrician refused to climb it to replace a bulb. The motion to grant the \$500 was moved by Donald Beer and seconded by Mrs. Jean McPherson.

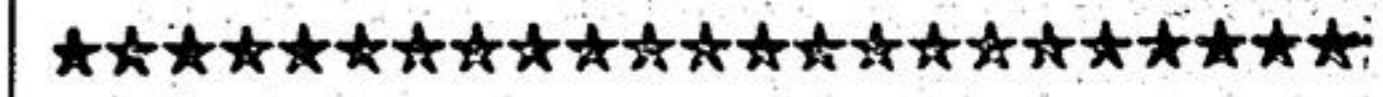
The Mt. Zion control artist was invited by Oshawa Tony's to perform on the mound in a game in the Motor City. The contest was scheduled for Wednesday (last night).
