HOLIDAY for the year 1962, of which all persons
are hereby requested to take notice and govern
themselves accordingly.

Metro Must Pay York \$153,057, Board Rules

The Ontario Municipal Board
has directed Metropolitan To-
ronto to pay York County \$152,
067 as relief from the tax bur-
den resulting from the Metro
incorporation of 1954, the board
announced last week.

The 12 suburbs, which joined
Toronto in the Metro corpora-
tion were previously compo-
nents of York county. They rep-
resented 87 per cent of the coun-
ty's population and assessment.

Under the legislation by
which Metropolitan Toronto
was incorporated, the county
was given the right to apply to
the OMB for financial redress
if the loss of this assessment
proved burdensome to the re-
mainder of the county.

When the county's application
was made, the municipal board
found that the only marked in-
crease in the county's tax pro-
gram had been in levies for
county and suburban roads.

C. F. Moore, Metro counsel,
argued that the new levies in
York County were not excessive
when compared with those of
other counties in Ontario. The
board ruled, however, that on
county roads purposes in 1953 to
increase from 1.6 mills for
4.47 mills in 1954 constituted an
undue burden on the county's
ratepayers.

The board ruled that Metro
should pay half the increase in
county road costs in 1954, 40
per cent of the 1955 increase,
and successively decreasing
amounts to 10 per cent in 1956.

For the years 1954 to 1957 the
board ruled the county should
pay 3 per cent of Metro's costs
in maintaining the equivalent of
county courthouse accommoda-
tion. For its use of the Don Jail,
the county will pay on a basis
of actual, prisoner-day costs.
