Oshawa Man Instantly Killed In Accident Near Claremont

A near head-on crash, two miles north of Claremont on the Brock Road, Sunday afternoon snuffed out the life of a 47 year old Oshawa man and sent six other persons to hospital. Eyewitnesses at the scene described the pain and agony endured by passengers in both cars as they awaited the arrival of doctors and ambulances.

Edward Surette, the driver of a 1957 Chevrolet died instantly. The motor, instrument panel and steering wheel were driven into the front seat and the victim appeared to take the full force of the impact. His daughter, Doris, 20, was seriously injured with a fractured pelvis, fractured hip and a punctured kidney. Three other passengers in the Surette auto suffered broken bones and lacerations.

Jack Morrison, 48, of Uxbridge, the driver of the other car, a 1959 Oldsmobile was also badly injured. His daughter, Donna, 11 suffered a broken arm and was admitted to the Uxbridge Hospital. Ambulances from Port Perry, Pickering and Uxbridge were rushed to the scene.

Mrs Redshaw aided in the release of the injured. The crash occurred at about 4:30 p.m. The pavement is marked by a solid white line on a slight curve and grade.

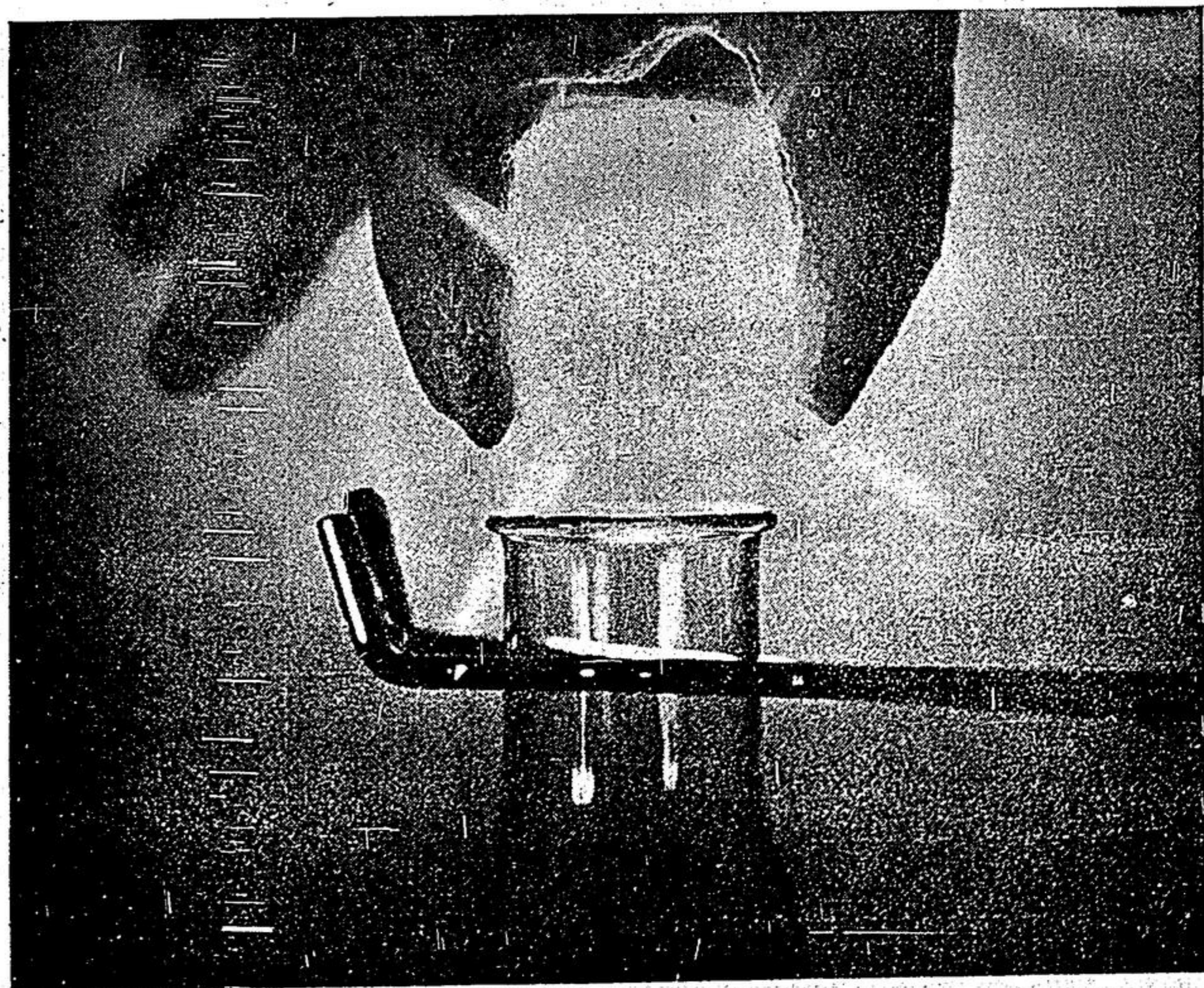
