Pickering Will Not Alter Policy on Parks This Year

Pickering Twp. Council has refused to alter its policy on the development of park properties within the municipality for 1962. The decision that specific communities must contribute a dollar for every dollar matched by the township was re-affirmed at a special meeting on Monday night.

A discussion on the matter was raised after a delegation from the West-Rouge area, headed by Mr. S. R. Frost, asked for \$900 to complete a playground parkette in their community. "If we must match dollar for dollar we will have to abandon the project," said the spokesman.

Councillor Hubert Wank contended that other Park Boards in the township had received funds on a matching basis. "To change it this year would start a hot potato rolling," he said. "Other projects in the township must be considered," he noted. He pointed out that on a \$900 request, it would mean that the West Rouge community would have to raise \$450.

"We feel that it is a township project and would be for the good of the entire municipality," argued Mr. Frost.

Reeve Sherman Scott suggested that perhaps the land, including five serviced lots in a registered subdivision should be sold for an estimated \$20,000 and the money used to purchase a larger parcel of property elsewhere.

Councillor Milton Mowbray contended that other communities such as Brougham and Greenwood had raised not hundreds but thousands of dollars to see the completion of their park programs. "They didn't even have a piece of land to start with," he said. "At the present time, I do not feel that the municipality can afford to pay 100% of park costs".
