Potato Growers Hold Meeting

A Potato Growers' meeting was held at the farm of Mr. Albert Hockley, Claremont, R.R. 1, on Thursday, August 9th.

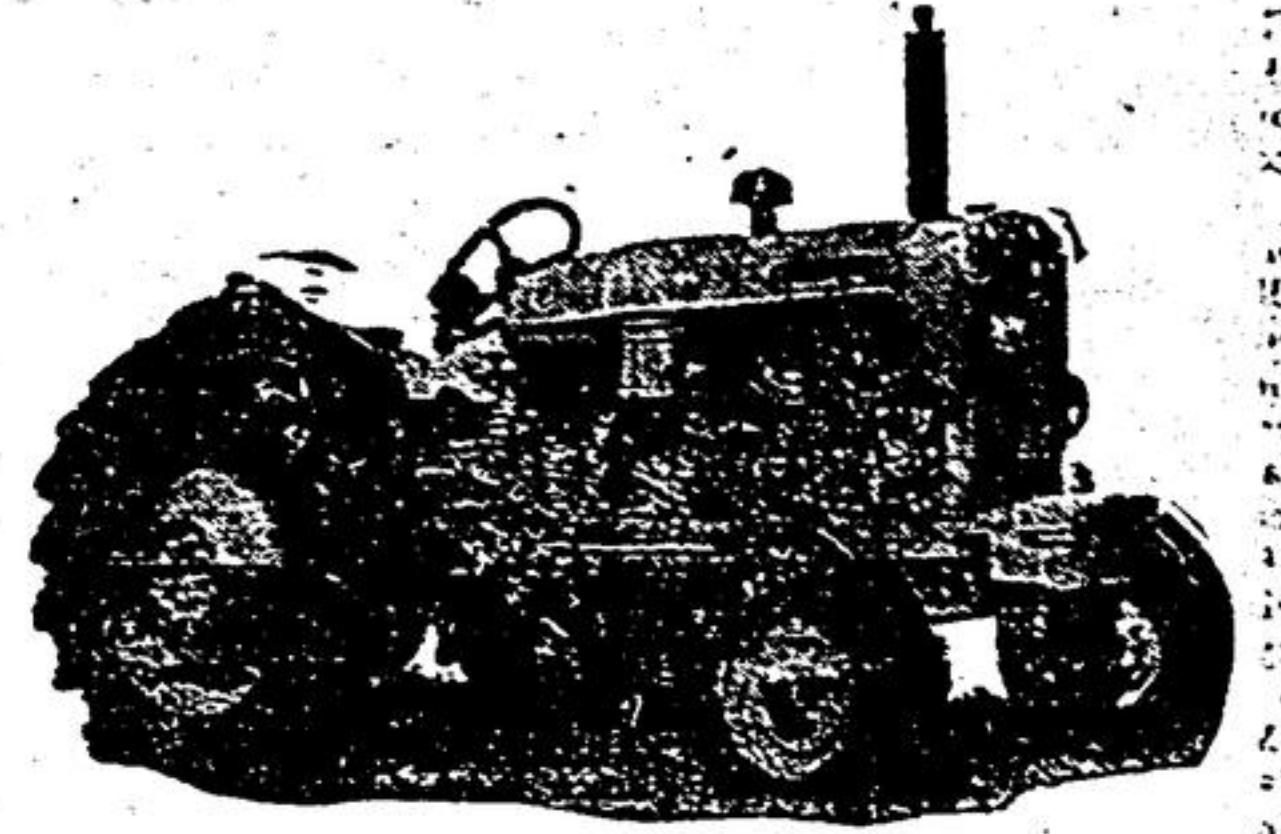
The meeting was sponsored by the Ontario County Potato Growers' Association and the Ontario Department of Agriculture. A number of commercial potato growers in the County and the members of the Scott 4-H Potato Club were present.

Mr. R. E. Goodin, Assistant Director, Field Crops Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, gave a talk on disease and insect control on potatoes.

The potato variety tests are located at Mr. Hockley's farm. There are seven varieties in the tests among which are some fairly new varieties which are being compared for yield and quality with the old standard varieties, such as Irish Cobbler and Sebago. Mr. Goodin went over each of these potato plots, outlining the strong and weak points of each variety.

At the conclusion of the field meeting, the 4-H Club Members judged two classes of potatoes under the direction of Mr. Walter Kerry, one of the Leaders of the Scott 4-H Club, and Mr. Lynn Fair, Agricultural Representative.

TIPS

ON A FAST, SAFE START FOR CALVES
