

International Plow Match Returns To 1933 Site

This year's International Plowing Match, to be held in Derby Township, four miles south of Owen Sound, on October 10 to 13 has two features which make the event unique.

This is the year when it might be said that lightning strikes twice in the same place. October 10 to 13, 1933 was the date of the last International Plowing Match held in Grey County and the site was exactly the same as planned for 1962.

Norman Barber, owner of the farm where most of the events will take place was only six years old when his father, the late Vernon Barber was host to the I.P.M. in 1933. Today, he is the successful operator of the

Unionville Streets To Be Named After Early Settlers

Streets in Unionville's Varley Village development will be named after the early settlers of Unionville. If the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board approves.

Mr and Mrs William Champion, of Unionville, have suggested several names of early residents to Tallden Investments Ltd., the developing firm, so that Unionville's rich historical heritage might be commemorated in the new subdivision.

Governor Simcoe enticed William von Moll Berczy to lead his colony of 64 families from New York State to Upper Canada in 1794. A land grant of 64,000 acres, and a promise of new roads, were offered the colonists.

In cutting their way through the dense forest north of the town of York, Markham Township settlers founded a trail now known as Yonge St.

Philip Eckardt and his seven sons, came with the group to farm the land around present-day Unionville. Their log house, north of the village is still inhabited.

The families Lunau, Pingel, Summerfeld, and Stiver, most influential in the following years, also came with von Berczy.

Others suggested for commemoration by street names are: Dr. MacKay, the doctor who seemed reluctant to send a bill, if he felt the family were in need of the money, and who ushered most of this younger generation into the world; Mr George Hambly and Mr Arthur Davidson, who contributed greatly to the early success of the community.

Tallden Investments Ltd., the firm developing Varley Village, wishes to preserve Unionville's distinctive history, and to capture some of its atmosphere.

In this regard, they plan to use elements of style from the three periods of older homes in Unionville. The split-rail fence, suggests the log house built at the end of the 18th century. Judicious use of vertical side-board would represent the preference of Unionville's second generation for the board and batten style. The third generation liked the substantial effect of brick, when they built in the 1850's, as do many people today.

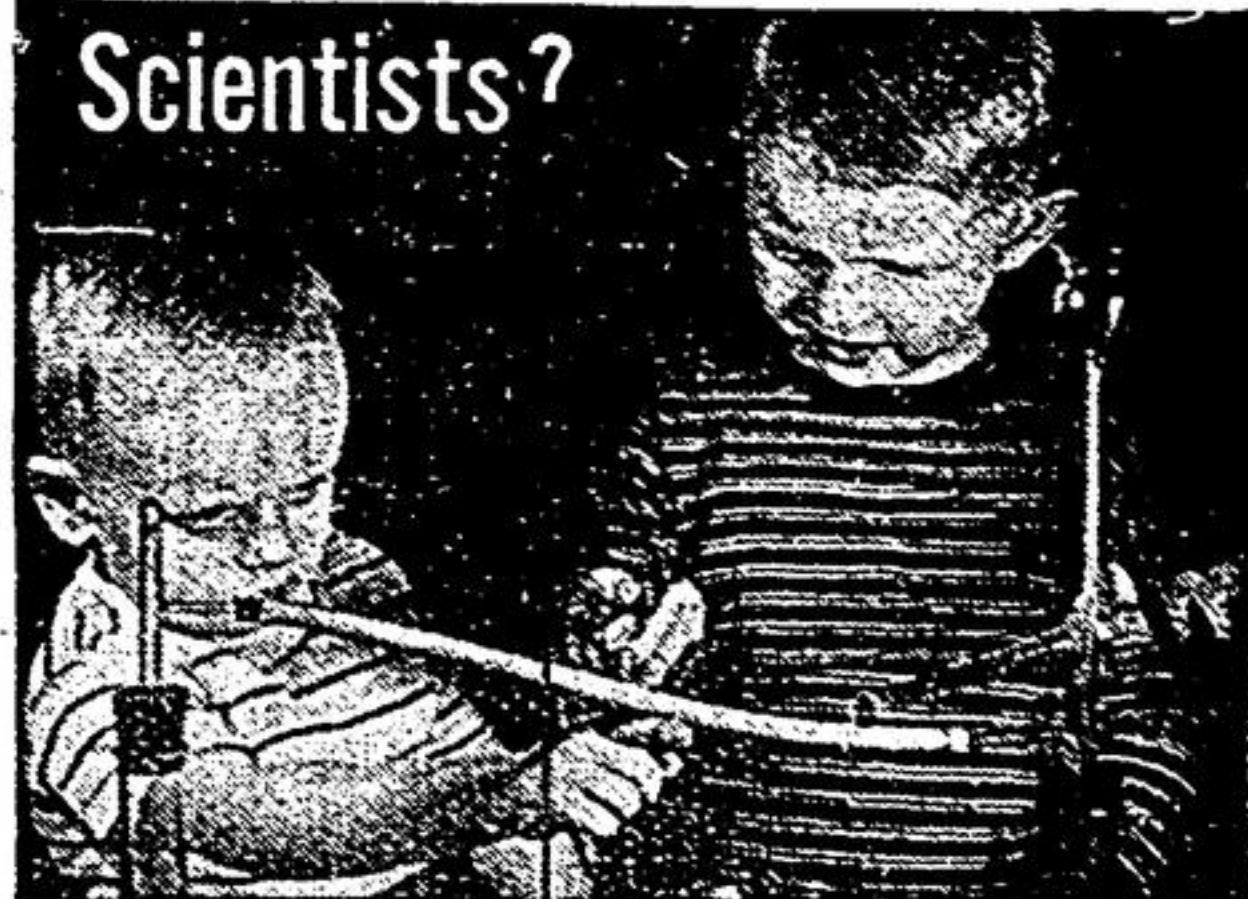

The Owen Sound businessmen have arranged for free bus service during the day from the plowing match site to the city's shopping area. As, and if, women tire of the farm scene and tented city, it will be a simple matter to board a bus, spend a couple of hours in modern stores, then return to the site in lots of time to "collect" their husbands.

Wagon tours through tented city and around the site are a feature each day, along with bands, majorettes, machinery parade and a host of other activities.

The official opening Wednesday, October 10, will see the Honorable William A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, officiating with Floyd A. Lashley, the O.P.A.'s key man, Robert Campbell, President of the O.P.A., Warden Henry Lantz of Grey assisting.

The Warden's challenge match takes place in the afternoon and to date, nine county wardens have indicated they will compete against Mr Lantz who farmed for many years in Carrick Township in Bruce and more latterly at Neustadt in Grey.

Each day has many "specials" to highlight the program which include championship classes, safety demonstrations, historical exhibits, industrial equipment exhibits and events for women and music.

The Award Banquet, to be held on Friday night at the Owen Sound Arena, will be, in effect, the wind-up for many of the plowing contestants. An estimated 1,200 people will be the guests of the City Council at the banquet.

Stores in the city will remain open in the evening until 9 p.m. and various organizations have planned variety shows and dances for each night to provide further entertainment for the visitors to Grey County.

An estimated 100,000 attended the International Plowing Match sponsored by Hastings County last year near Belleville and Elgin County had almost that number at St. Thomas in 1960. Truly a worthwhile event, people of both rural and urban centres should plan to attend the 1962 I.P.M. in Grey County near Owen Sound.

Mr and Mrs Eric McFadyen of Unionville visited Mr and Mrs Bert McFadyen of Parry Sound.

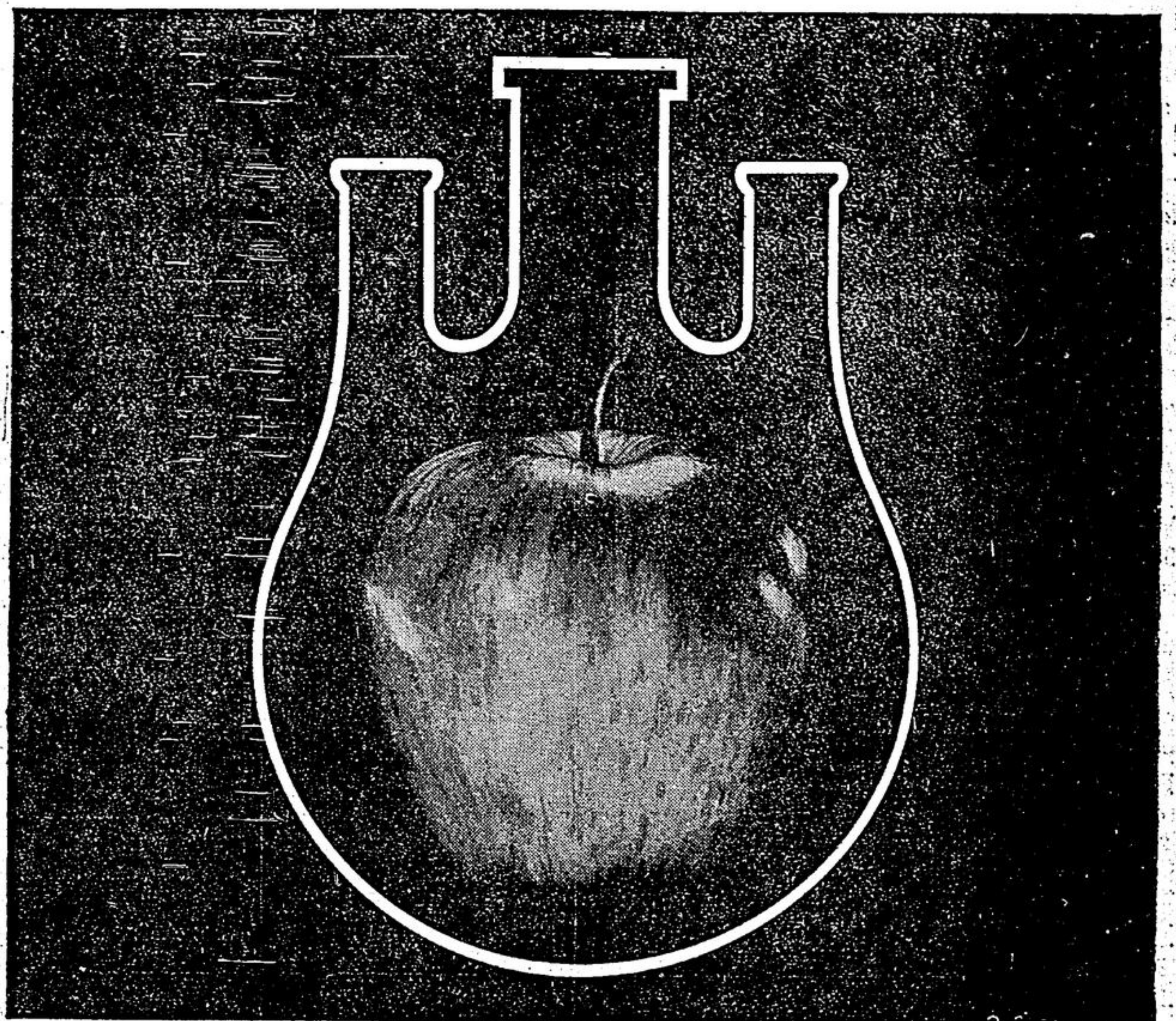
Mr and Mrs Douglas Brown have just returned from a two week holiday at their cottage on the Trent Canal.
