

# Goodwood Team Posts Three Victories To Sweep Claremont Softball Tournament

The Goodwood softball teams just keep rolling along providing the Claremont Community League with some of the best competition since Mt. Zion vacated the group. Dean Watson's boys proved their worth last week by sweeping three straight games in the annual Claremont Field Day tournament. They whipped Altona 8-6; downed Greenwood Srs. 5-1 and defeated Pickering Srs., 6-1 in the final. The winners received \$30. The runners-up were given \$20.

Righthander, Ken May turned in a great 3-game effort on the Goodwood mound. In the three contests he allowed 19 hits, walked 3 and struck out 12. He appeared to improve as the tournament progressed and against Pickering he fired a stingy 4-hitter. It was actually his fourth game in three days since he hurled Goodwood to a group playoff victory against Altona on Thursday night.

Pickering earned the right to advance into the tournament finals on Saturday afternoon by registering a major 5-4 upset victory over Greenwood Srs. on Friday night. Bob Carlisle, working in relief of Pickering starter, Bill Moffatt, twirled a torrid no-hitter while his mates came up with two big runs to win.

Errors Huri The Pickering-Goodwood game was actually a fine pitcher's duel as was expected but Pickering's defences looked unusually weak. They committed a total of 4 errors which allowed 4 of Goodwood's six runs to cross the plate. Carlisle actually matched May with a sizzling 4-hitter but in the fielding department there was no comparison. Goodwood did not make a single bobble in the 7 innings and completed a splitsecond double play in the 5th. Pickering went down in order in the

2nd, 5th and 6th. Stewart Bros. Shine The Stewart brothers, Ron and Keith turned in fine 3-game efforts for the tournament champs. Ron, a centrefield rover, slammed out a single, a double and a home run. His circuit clout against Greenwood Srs. scored two runs in the third inning and paved the way for his team's 5-1 victory. Keith Stewart, performed in right field,

whacked out three singles. One single-base drive in the 4th inning against Altona pushed two mates across the plate and tied the score. The brother combination completed a total of 8 putouts in the field. Roger Forsyth enjoyed good games at the plate. The Goodwood first-sacker poked out two singles and a double. Ken May, Ron May and Jerry McCuekin each had a pair of singles.

Real Upset Although Goodwood's power, both at the plate and on the mound, might have been a trifle under-rated, their march to the tournament title was not the most amazing event of the series. Pickering's upset 5-4 victory over Greenwood Srs. was a surprise, however. Greenwood held a 4-3 edge when their coach, Earl Gauslin pulled starter, Bill Maxwell in favour of Bob Cledd. He

quelled a Pickering rally with two straight strike-outs. That's when Pickering coach, Earl Rowe made his move. With two men on base in the 5th inning, he substituted his whirlwind righthander, Bob Carlisle for starter, Bill Moffatt. He loaded up the sacks, then fired three strikes past three players, Gord McDowell, Grant Morgan and Allan Redshaw. Then Pickering turned on the plate over. Pinch-hitter, Don Rowe dou. d in the 6th. Dave Britton was safe on an error and first-sacker, Bob Moffatt slammed a two-base blow to score both the tying and game-winning runs. Greenwood went down in order in their half of the 6th and again in the 7th.

## Goodwood Ousts Altona From Group Playoff In Two Games

A new club will win the Claremont Community Championship this season. Altona, the defending champs and holders of the title in five out of ten years, were knocked out of the running by Goodwood on Thursday night in the first playoff round. Goodwood took the series opener 10-5 and swept the second contest 9-6.

As in many previous games, Goodwood spotted their rivals a substantial lead, only to rally in the late innings and pull a victory out of the fire. A combination of hits, walks and errors in the 7th inning allowed the winners to push six men across the plate. Altona had held a 4-3 edge before Goodwood took their final turn at the bat.

Altona starter, Jim Redshaw was working on a 5-hitter for six innings. He ran into trouble in the 7th and was replaced by Lloyd Pascoe. Ken May handled the mound chores for Goodwood. He was clipped for 7 hits.

Goodwood took advantage of five Altona errors to score five unearned runs. Ken May and Ron Stewart connected for the only extra-base blows. May slammed a triple but was tagged out at the plate in the 5th. Stewart belted a 2-run double in the 7th. Single-base Goodwood blows came from the bats of Ray McGuckin, Bob Todd (2), and Reger Forsyth. Altona's, John Little poked a 3-run homer in the first inning. The tremendous blast to left field came with team mates, John Segriff and Eric Pilkey on base. Pete Duncac whacked out a double in the 7th. Lead-off batsman, Geo. Neal had two hits, both bunt singles. Altona left five men stranded on the base paths. Goodwood marooned four. One of the largest crowds of the season watched the playoff doubleheader. In the other contest, Brougham edged Uxbridge 2-1.
