



Tragic Accident

A 33 year old Ballantrae man was instantly killed last week when he was pinned under a 4-ton tractor-loader that toppled down a 25 foot embankment at the Markham Sand and Gravel Co. pit. Clifford Wallwork, son of the

Death Of Whitchurch Reeve's Son Shocks Entire Township

The tragic death of Mr Clifford Wallwork, son of the Reeve of Whitechurch Township has shocked the entire municipality. The deceased was pinned under a tractor-loader after it toppled over a 25 foot embankment at the Markham Sand and Gravel Co. pit on Wednesday morning of last week. It marked the first serious accident in the firm's more than ten years of operation. The victim was only 33 years old.

Two Cyclists Injured In Two Days On Town Streets

Throughout the summer vacation, Stouffville children have been rather fortunate to escape serious injuries in Main Street accidents. On the weekend, however, two young cyclists had narrow escapes in two successive incidents.

On Friday, 8 year old Mark Harrott, son of Mr and Mrs Chas. Harrott, Hawthorne Ave., was thrown from his bicycle but suffered only gravel burns on his back. He was treated by Dr. Donald Smith of Stouffville. P. C. Hugh Vankoughnet investigated the mishap.

On Saturday evening, 9 year old Roderick Schell, son of Mr and Mrs Ken Schell, Clarke St., suffered cuts and bruises when he was struck by a westbound car on Main Street. The auto, driven by Mr Geo. Stone, Tenth Line N., skidded more than forty feet and the impact was not severe. The lad was treated by Dr. D. J. Petrie and permitted to return home. The accident was investigated by P. C.

Link Lake Youth With Safe Theft

A nineteen year old Musselman's Lake youth has been linked with one and perhaps two other men who broke into the J. J. Gibson poultry processing plant at Port Perry last week and took an estimated \$1,400 from the safe.

Leonard Jackson, Stouffville, R.R.2, was charged last week by Port Perry police with break and entry and the possession of stolen money. Working in cooperation with O.P.P. at Vandorf, Jackson was arrested at Musselman's Lake following a police stake-out at a home there. According to police, about \$600 was found in Jackson's possession.

The 1,500 pound safe was moved from the front office of the plant and blown open with nitro-glycerin in a back room. The break-in occurred during the early-hours of Monday morning, Aug. 27th and Jackson was picked up a few hours later.

Mrs Victor Leonard, conc. 6, Whitchurch had just closed up her premises and was preparing to leave when she was confronted by two men. While one brandished what appeared to be a .22 rifle, the other took the money from her car. Neither man was masked.

Mrs Leonard drove north on the Don Mills Road and called the Vandorf Office of the Ontario Provincial Police. Road blocks were set up around the area but none was successful in apprehending the culprits.

Pickering Deputy-Reeve Suggests Ambulance Service For All Of Township

Deputy-Reeve, Mrs Jean McPherson has suggested that Pickering Twp. Council give serious consideration to the purchase of a municipal-owned and operated ambulance. She introduced the subject at a regular meeting of Council at Brougham on Tuesday night.

Mrs McPherson said that on Saturday, a 2½ year old girl was injured in a traffic accident in the township and an ambulance did not arrive at the scene until almost thirty minutes had elapsed.

Reeve Sherman Scott warned that such a project could prove very costly, not only in the initial expenditure to purchase a vehicle but in the personnel that would be required to operate it on a 24-hour, round-the-clock basis.

"I feel they should," returned the Deputy-Reeve. Mrs McPherson suggested that such a service could possibly be handled through the police department. Councillor Ross Deakin noted that with the completed switch-over to a telephone dial system, a township-wide hookup could be arranged through either the police or fire departments.

Attendance At Orchard Pk. School Soars to 337

A total of 337 pupils will be enrolled in the Orchard Park Public School, Stouffville when work is completed on the new addition, according to the Principal, Mr Keith Sutherland. Until the project is finalized, grades 6, 7 and 8 will be accommodated in the Summitview School.

In the September term of last year, only 255 boys and girls filed through the doors on opening day. The school will now handle all grades from Kindergarten through to grade 8.

Seventy-two friends and relatives were present at Malton airport on Thursday evening, Aug. 30, to bid farewell to Mr and Mrs Allan Doner, Dale, and five weeks old Donna Ruth who left by B.O.A.C. flight 606, at 8:30 p.m. arriving in London, Eng. Friday morning. On the same evening they left London and arrived at Kano in Northern Nigeria at 5:30 a.m. Saturday.

Mr and Mrs Doner will be stationed at Mokwa where Mr Doner will resume his duties as Sec. Treas. for the United Missionary Society, and also manager of the mission schools in Nigeria. Mrs Doner will be on the staff of the Teacher Training College at Mokwa. Dale who is in grade 2, will be boarding at Rockhaven—a home for missionaries' children at Jos—400 mi. from his parents.

The Doners first went to Africa in Oct. 1953. They left for their second term in Africa in Nov. 1957. They came home for furlough in June 1961 and resided at the Milled apartment in Gormley.

Allan is the younger son of Mr and Mrs Sam Doner, and Dorine is a daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs A. T. Gooding. Both attended Richmond Hill High School. Mrs Doner attended Toronto Teachers' College and taught for several years at Victoria Square. Allan served overseas in the Medical Corps in the Army during the war. Prior to going to Nigeria in 1953, they kept store for 6 years at Gormley.

Mr Wm. Sanders of Stouffville, a graduate of Toronto Teachers' College has accepted a position on the staff of the Kinmount Public School. He is the son of Mr and Mrs Wm. Sanders, Albert St., and a graduate of Stouffville Dist. High School.

Youth Injured In Motorcycle Accident

A nineteen year old Brougham boy was quite seriously injured last week in an accident near Hull, Quebec. Geo. Malcolm, son of Mr and Mrs Robt. Malcolm, Logust Hill, R.R.1 was thrown from a motorcycle after it was in collision with a car.

He is presently confined to the Sacred Heart Hospital in Hull, Quebec. He suffered a broken leg, a fractured pelvis, head and internal injuries. On Sunday, his parents and a brother, Howard motored to Hull.

A graduate of Pickering Dist. High School, George had attended Carleton University last year. Some confusion resulted after the accident when Quebec police authorities forwarded an incorrect name to Markham Twp. Police in an effort to locate the next of kin. After considerable checking, the parents were finally contacted.

TWO KILLED AT VIVIAN

The mother and father of five children were killed on Sunday in a two-car crash at Vivian. Arthur William Lloyd, 37 died almost instantly at the accident scene. His wife, Grace Irene, 33 succumbed en route to hospital.

FARMER FILES \$300 SHEEP CLAIM

Pickering Twp. Council will discuss in committee a claim of \$300 for sheep killed on the property of Mr Kenneth Chafen, conc. 7, Pickering, near Green River. This figure could run even higher if other animals in the flock have been damaged.

Livestock valuator, Mr Warren Willson discussed the matter briefly with the Council at a regular meeting on Tuesday night.

The loss on the Chafen farm included 12 ewes, 8 lambs and 1 ram.

Three sheep were also killed and two others damaged on the premises of Mr Ross Horon, east of Clarendon. The amount of this claim was not disclosed. The owners are aware of the dog responsible for the loss but are not willing to have it destroyed.

Costs \$4,798.50 For Plumbing Inspection

Some months ago the matter of continuing to have plumbing inspection by the county, was discussed by Markham Township council and it was suggested that the amount paid to the county would be sufficient to engage a township man.

Deputy-reeve Mumberson asked that the Health Unit provide the Markham figure for 1961 and last week this was revealed as \$1,798.50.

No further action was taken on the matter.
