## Sod-Turning Ceremony For Meat Processing Plant September 19th

A farmer, picked at random, will turn the first sod in a new meat processing plant to which thousands of Ontario farmers have each contributed \$100. Ceremony takes place Wednesday, September 19th.

Invited to perform the sod-turning duty is David Ireland, Teeswater. His name was selected simply because his share certificate number in Farmers' Allied Meat Enterprises (FAME) is 1962. "A year of hope for Ontario livestock producers," explains FAME President C. W. McInnis, Iroquois. The ceremony, near Ayr, will be watched by hundreds of FAME shareholders. Also invited are local dignitaries, provincial political leaders and newsmen. Speaker will be J. A. Courteau, Montreal, who manages a giant farmer-owned meat processing organization in Quebec.

FAME was set up nearly two years ago to give Ontario farmers some control over marketing their livestock. For years they have maintained that high costs and low market prices are squeezing their margins. Last year, average income per farm in Eastern Canada was only \$2,549, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics - and that was a better-than-average year. They hope FAME will improve their position.

The meat processing plant which Mr. Ireland's spade will begin is the first of a proposed series of seven spaced throughout the province. Construction should be completed next year, and an advertising program to gain consumer acceptance will be in planning stage shortly.

## Roller Skating Champion At Uxbridge

Eighteen year old Beverley Anne Bowers of Toronto, the Senior Ladies roller skating champion of North-America in 1962, will perform in the Uxbridge Arena on Saturday, Sept. 22nd. The holder of a gold medal award, it is the highest proficiency prize that can be obtained.

Beverly started on her competitive roller skating career in 1950 at the age of 6 years. At a recent performance in Lincoln, Nebraska, she successfully defended her senior title and received a standing ovation from an appreciative audience.

To date, there are 99 medals, trophies, plaques and awards won in R.S.R.O.A. sanctioned competitions. Comprising Canadian Meets - twenty-six firsts, two seconds and three third placements; U.S.A. Eastern Regional Meets - eleven firsts, seven seconds, and two third placements. North American National Meets - two firsts, three seconds and three fourth placements. There are 25 first place Invitational State Meets and fifteen proficiency test medals along with three amateur judging commission awards.

As a starter during 1950, Latin instructor Beverley Anne and her brother "Bill" in pairs and freestyle dance and figures. Further professional lessons were taken from Jack Jackson, London; Doris Jenkins, Toronto; Norman Latin, Reading, Pennsylvania; Rose Martin Blavatt, Detroit; Paul Lampkin, Pontiac, Mich.; Gail Locke, Detroit; Mary Anne Dejons, Buffalo, N. Y. and Edward "Fuzzy" Bossart, Titusville.

For out-of-town lessons, approximately every second weekend, from 1953 to 1961 regarding the following return trip mileage: to Reading 1050 miles, London 250 miles - Detroit 525 miles - Pontiac 600 miles - Buffalo 210 miles - Pittsburgh 800 miles.

Always eager to skate and enthusiastically inclined toward travelling, Beverley (in company with her mother) has toured 450,000 miles in 12 years throughout the U.S.A. and Canada, for lessons, sanctioned competitions and exhibitions, benefit shows, Canadian Regional and National Meets. Since 1950 she has qualified every year to skate the Nationals. Two of these could not be attended and one National (Boston Meet) was not skated due to torn ligaments sustained in practice during the meet. At Nationals in 1953 and 1961, the Juvenile and Senior Ladies Freestyle Titles were won by Beverley Anne. In 1954-56 she won second placements. This marks the first time this event has been won by or has had a runner-up other than a U.S.A. skater - The first time a Canadian has won two North American National titles in the Amateur Roller Skating Arts.

As a Canadian Champion as well as a U.S.A. Title holder since an early age, she has been invited to star in many and varied benefit shows in both countries. The most recent being, "A hands across the border benefit for March of Dimes in Celeron, N.Y."

All her schooling has been in Toronto, Canada, graduating with first class honours from Public School and first class Academic Honours to Grade 11 at Malvern Collegiate Institute. Beverley Anne is now attending Grade 13 Final Academic year in preparation for entering a Business College next year.

School sports are always a 'must' with her; and at the age of 10 she won the Public School Senior Ladies Track and Field Total Points Award. During Collegiate, basketball and volleyball claimed attention along with archery and swimming. As a Clarinetist she played in the school orchestra. Football, Track and Field and Hockey Games are her favourite spectator sports.

## WAS ONE OF SCARBOROUGH'S FIRST FARMS

The McIntosh farm at Hill-side, one of the first farms in Scarborough Township is now being sold in separate parcels of land.

In 1895 Mrs. Annie Stouffer sold the property to Mr. John Pearse, who sold it to Mr. George McIntosh in 1911. The original stone house, pictured below, built in 1852 was sold with some land to Mr. A. R. Courtice in 1936, and another stone house built nearby where the McIntosh family resided until the death of Mr. McIntosh in July, 1959, when the estate was left to be sold.

The Southern half containing the buildings has recently been sold to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Capson, who also purchased the Courtice property. The new owners are planning extensive changes but will retain the original lines.

At present the youngest McIntosh son, Enoch, still farms the land, and will continue to do so until the remaining acres are sold. A parcel of 57 acres bordered on the North by Passmore Avenue, and on the East by the Little Rouge River is now in the hands of - Reg. A. Powell - Real Estate Broker.

With the breaking up of the McIntosh farm, one more step is gained by the encroaching city, and another milestone of farm life in Scarborough Township is past.

## High School News

The fall term at Stouffville District High has just begun and already the student council has embarked upon a project to raise money for its various activities. In the president's opening address last Tuesday, it was learned that the student council planned to undertake the sale of text books to the student body, this year. Student Council President, Paul Glover, explained that the books were being purchased wholesale from the publisher and would be sold at a slightly higher rate but at a price that would assure a saving for the consumer. By the end of last week, favourable sales had virtually assured the success of the venture. This is the first time a sale of this kind has been attempted at the school.

Another first at the Stouffville High is the full time guidance program to be handled by Mrs. Gresham. Mr. Duxbury introduced the project as one that is needed and desired. He stated that not enough of this type of work had been done in previous years. The guidance program hopes to aid the students in their choice of options and future vocations.

Since it is with the student body that the success of our council lies, both the principal and the president urged the students to support their student council.

## FAVOUR ASSESSING DONE LOCALLY

According to the opinions of several Stouffville councillors, the local council favours assessing in this municipality be done locally, rather than on a county system.

Reeve Timbers touched on the subject at the regular meeting of Stouffville council Thursday evening, and said he didn't think a county system would work as well. "I can see a number of troubles that would arise, one being, court of revision," he said.

"Strangers wouldn't know local values as well as someone at home," said councillor Spang.

Reeve Timbers pointed out that any move to set up a complete county assessment system required one hundred per cent endorsement by all municipalities.

"It won't get anywhere," was the deputy-reeve's comment. He also pointed out that several municipalities had assessors who had been on the job a long time and whom they wouldn't wish to change before retirement.

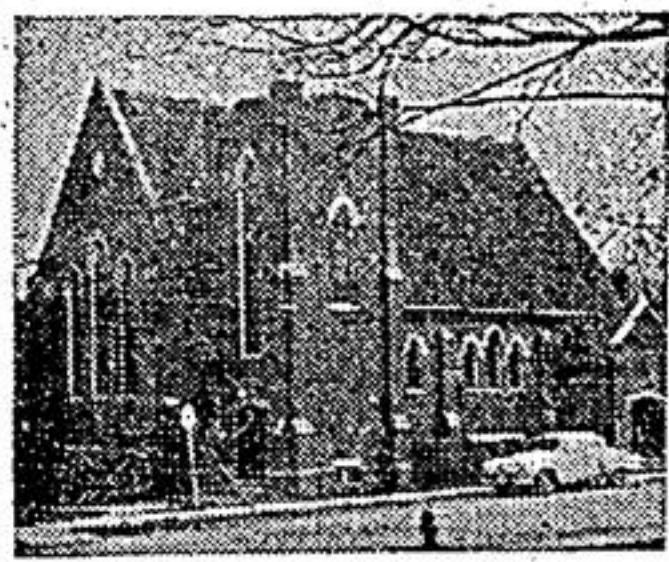
