### SABIN POLIOMYELITIS VACCINE

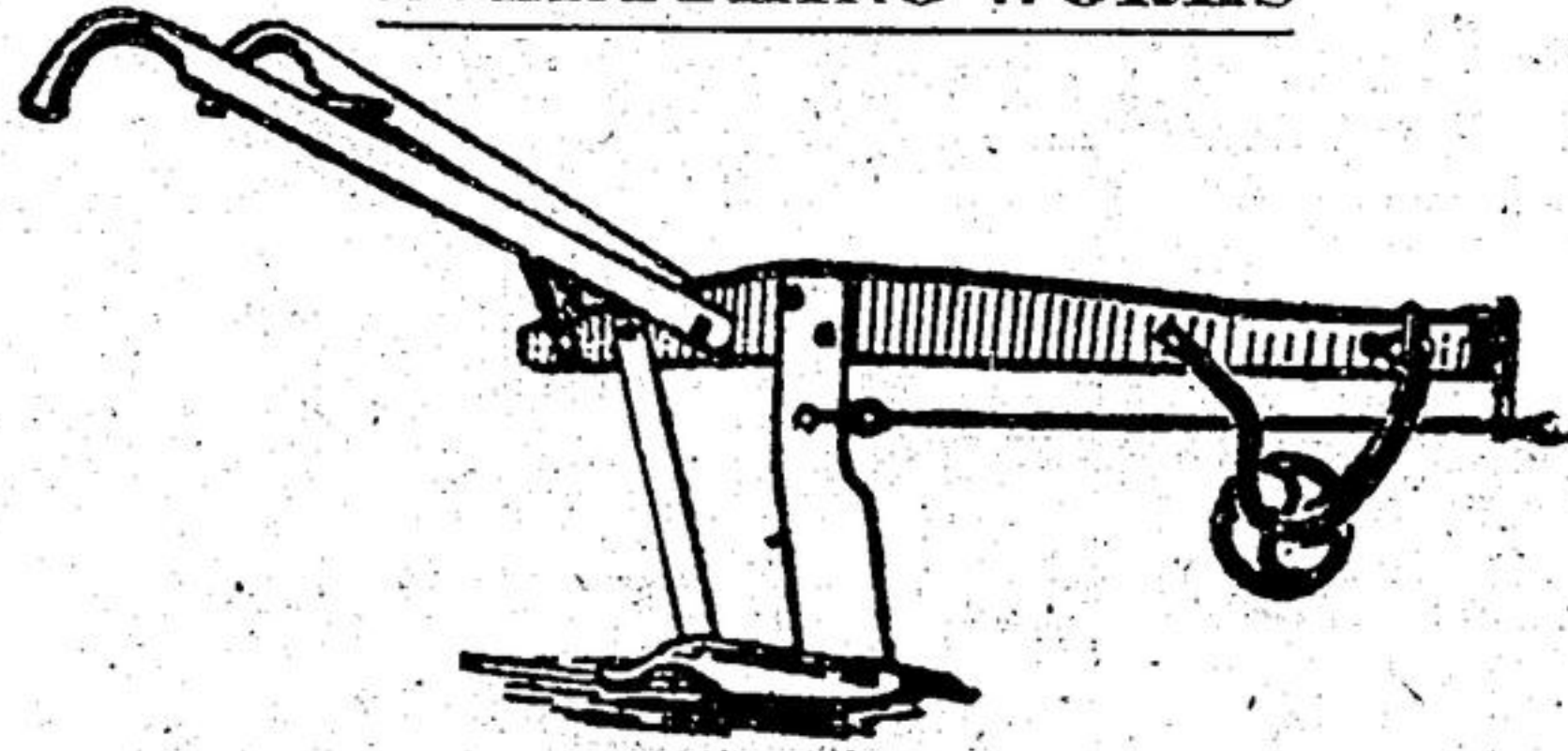
The announcement made by the Minister of National Health and Welfare suggests that there may be an element of risk, however small, in the use of oral poliomyelitis vaccine. In the light of this suggestion, it would appear to be inadvisable at this time to resume the use of the vaccine, and therefore the programme for the administration of the second dose of the two-dose series scheduled to start on October 9th in this area, is postponed and its resumption will depend upon clarification of the situation.

In May and June this year, over 782,000 people received oral poliomyelitis vaccine in Metropolitan Toronto and York County. This year, for the first time, no cases of poliomyelitis have been reported in this area, and there need be no fear among those who received oral vaccine of future complications from the vaccine given at that time.

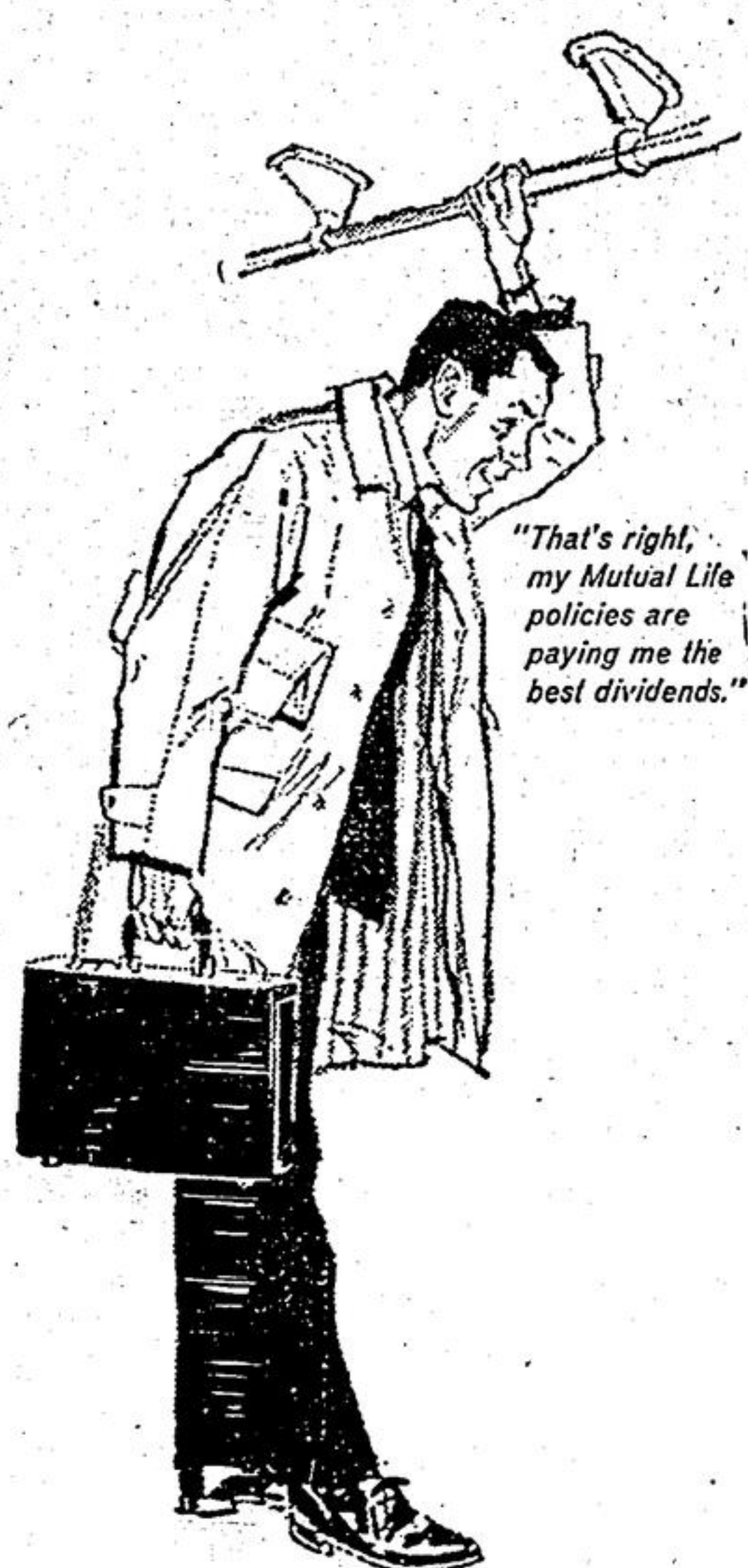
