Amherstburg moved into Markham on Saturday, confident that they could at least gain a split in a twinbill match and take the "rubber game" back to their home grounds on Sunday. They failed to estimate the lefthanded pitching power of Markham mound ace, Bob Ellis. In the 18 innings of the doubleheader, Ellis struck out a total of 31 men, thirteen of these in the afternoon opener and eighteen more in the nightcap. The "Aces" swept both games by identical scores of 3-0.


