

ELLIS HURLS "ACES" TO DOUBLE SHUT-OUT

Strikes Out 31 Batters In 18 Innings

Amherstburg moved into Markham on Saturday, confident that they could at least gain a split in a twin-bill match and take the "rubber game" back to their home grounds on Sunday. They failed to estimate the lefthanded pitching power of Markham mound ace, Bob Ellis. In the 18 innings of the doubleheader, Ellis struck out a total of 31 men, thirteen of these in the afternoon opener and eighteen more in the nightcap. The "Aces" swept both games by identical scores of 3-0.

Markham now advances into the O. A. S. A. Intermediate "B" South Ontario finals against Mount Hope. They open their series in Markham on Saturday afternoon at 1:30 p.m.

Fan Approval

Ellis' mound performance was applauded on several occasions, especially in the floodlight final when he pushed his strike-out total deep into the double figures. Amherstburg had one serious rally rolling in the 5th inning when they loaded up the sacks. The men died on base as Ellis claimed the next three batters in order. He was clipped for 4 hits in the opener and yielded 3 safeties in the second game. Bob Sorenson on the mound for the visitors twirled a 9-hitter, giving up 4 drives in the first contest and 5 in the final.

Timely Hits

Markham catcher, Jim McWhirter delivered the pay-off blow in the opener. His solid smash down the right field line in the 4th inning with team-mates, Bob Atkinson and Harry Young aboard provided the "Aces"

margin of victory. The round-tripper cleared the sacks. In the second encounter, it was the veteran Harry Young who punched a single into centrefield in his first trip to the plate and pushed Jackie Robinson and Lawrence Gayman over to score. Bob Atkinson added another in the 9th on Bernie McGriskin's single-base drive through the middle.

It is unlikely that any other player in the "Aces" line-up can better the playoff record of centrefield rover, Harry Young. Through the years he has come up with the "big" plays both at the plate and in a defensive role. In Saturday's twin-bill, he kept his performance feats intact with a .500 batting average and a clean centrefield slate.

Good In Defeat

Amherstburg's star would have to go to their brilliant shortstop ace, Phil Abbott. Although he could scratch out only one hit in 8 at bats, he completed two put-out plays that left the fans open-mouthed with amazement. In the 5th inning of the first game he "robbed" Markham's Bill Johnson of a single with a stabbing back-hand catch of a line shot. In the 4th inning of the series final he gloved Bernie McGriskin's solid drive to retire the side. Like Ellis, he too gained well-deserved spectator applause. The Amherstburg catcher, Norm Jones and the third baseman, Bob Fryer performed against the "Aces" back in 1952 when Markham marched through to an Ontario Title on the right arm of pitcher, Doug "Peg" O'Neill.

Plan To Construct Large Open-Air Rink For Ballantrae Area

In recent months the community Church at Ballantrae has been investigating the possibility of the creation of an outdoor skating rink to serve the community of Ballantrae & district during the winter, and much work was done with regard to this investigation prior to determining that the need for such a project in the area was so great that the community as a whole should be involved in the project.

Having determined the need a meeting was held Sept. 13 by a cross section of the community to discuss the formation of the skating rink project. During the discussion at the meeting attended by fifteen, it was found that not only was this a real need but an urgent one. Those present decided to set up a committee of those in attendance with the understanding that any others interested would be welcome. They elected as chairman Bruce Forfar, and as secretary-treasurer, Allan Grose.

The following items were discussed by the committee at length, and subject to finalization on each item, were approved in principle:

- 1 That an outdoor rink be constructed, approximate size, 75' x 175'.
- 2 That portable change rooms will be constructed adjacent to the rink, and that these rooms should be electrically heated if possible, and that where pos-

- 3 That the rink be lighted at night by overhead lights.
- 4 That the tentative location of the rink be adjacent to the road on the property of Erie Mfg., which is lot 21, con.
- 5 That water for the rink is available and will be pumped from the existing well which is on the property. The pump is capable of handling 1400 gallons per hour.
- 6 That hydro is available to flood light the rink, as well as to heat the change rooms, if feasible.
- 7 That a committee be formed to discuss the question of whether bumper guards should be installed all around the rink or if logs should be located around to indicate the area.
- 8 That the base will be polyethylene, placed on the ground and sealed to hold the water until such time as it freezes.
- 9 That local labour be utilized in keeping the rink clean, either by mechanical or manual means.
- 10 That a windbreak be constructed if needed to protect it from the winds.

The committee as a whole was enthusiastic and a recommendation was made calling on all committee members and their wives and families to participate in soliciting funds and furthermore that a brochure be sent to all residents in Ballantrae and district requesting funds for the construction.

It was further hoped that everyone in the area would consider this a community project and volunteer for services that may be needed.

Mr. Clifford Wallwork, Reeve of Whitechurch Township was present to explain that such a community drive and project could be eligible for grants.

MINOR HOCKEY PLAYERS TO REGISTER, OCT. 6 & 13

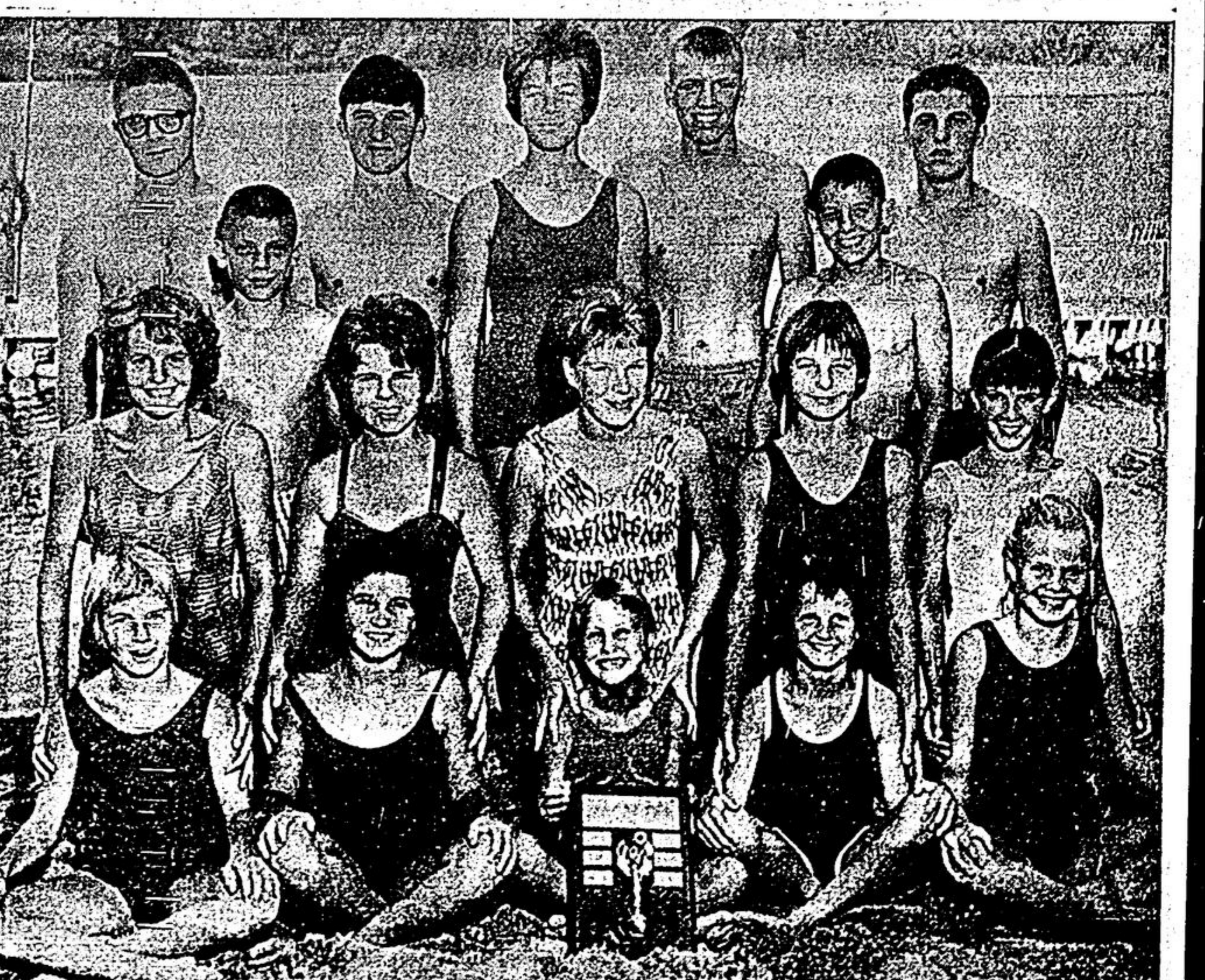
