WHITCHURCH TWP. LIQUOR VOTE ON NOVEMBER 21st

The liquor vote in the Twp. of Whitchurch will be held on Saturday, Nov. 21st according to an agreement reached by the members of Council at a special meeting last week. The date is subject to the approval of the Liquor Control Board.

Only one question will be placed on the ballot. It will read "are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a dining lounge licence for consumption with meals on a licenced premises."

Action was taken by the Council after a petition containing 1,300 signatures was submitted in favour of a plebiscite.

Two Youths Hospitalized in Separate Outbreaks of Teen-age Violence

15-Yr.-Old Beaten After School Dance Two youths were hospitalized and two others have been charged with assault following an outbreak of violence in Stouffville and district last week.

The latest incident involved a 15-year-old grade 9 student at the conclusion of a dance in the Stouffville Dist. High School on Friday night. Wayne Keeler, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Keeler, Vandorf Road, Whitchurch Twp. was walking a girl companion home after leaving the school bus on No. 48 Hwy. He was beaten by a gang of seven youths who had apparently followed the bus from Stouffville to the stop-off point in a car. A neighbour notified the boy's parents.

The lad's injuries were so serious that he had to be carried into his house. He was later admitted to the York County Hospital at Newmarket for treatment and observation and released on Saturday. He returned to regular classes on Monday but was still feeling the effects of his injuries.

Ontario Provincial Police of the Vandorf Detachment are investigating the attack. Six local youths have been questioned and a charge of assault will be laid against Donald Harnden, Loreta Cresc., Stouffville.

Mrs. Keeler told The Tribune that the family had been living on their present premises for only a short time. "We're beginning to wonder if we came to the wrong place," she said. P.C. John Lizotte is in charge of the case and the charge against Harnden will be aired in court in October.

Confiscate Over 4,000 Bottles of Beer in Raid on Golf Club

Vandorf Ontario Provincial Police officers swooped in on the Rolling Hills Golf Club, 5th concession of Whitchurch, at Bethesda, on Sunday in a surprise raid under the Liquor Control Act. The police seized more than four thousand bottles of beer and 100 bottles of liquor, the largest "haul" to be made in such a raid locally, in some years.

Ten persons found on the premises consuming, were charged under the Act with consuming in a place other than a residence, and a charge of keeping for sale is also pending. It had been rumoured during the weekend that raids had been carried out in at least four locations throughout Whitchurch and Markham Townships, but the information proved erroneous, only the one seizure being made.

Juvenile Damage Should Be Charged to Parents Markham Council Agrees

Markham Twp. Council has given its approval to an Oakville resolution that would effect a charge-back to parents for damage to property caused by juveniles. Proof of guilt would first have to be obtained.

In a recent ruling handed down by Judge Alex. C. Hall in Second Division Court at Brougham he informed the plaintiff of a damage claim that, with some exceptions, a parent had no legal obligation to cover the cost of their children's wrongdoing.

The Oakville decision would, if necessary assess the damage costs against the parent's property if remuneration was not made in an amicable manner. Such a move would be similar to cases of tax arrears.

Pipe-laying Project No Secret Says Owner Whitchurch Duck Farm

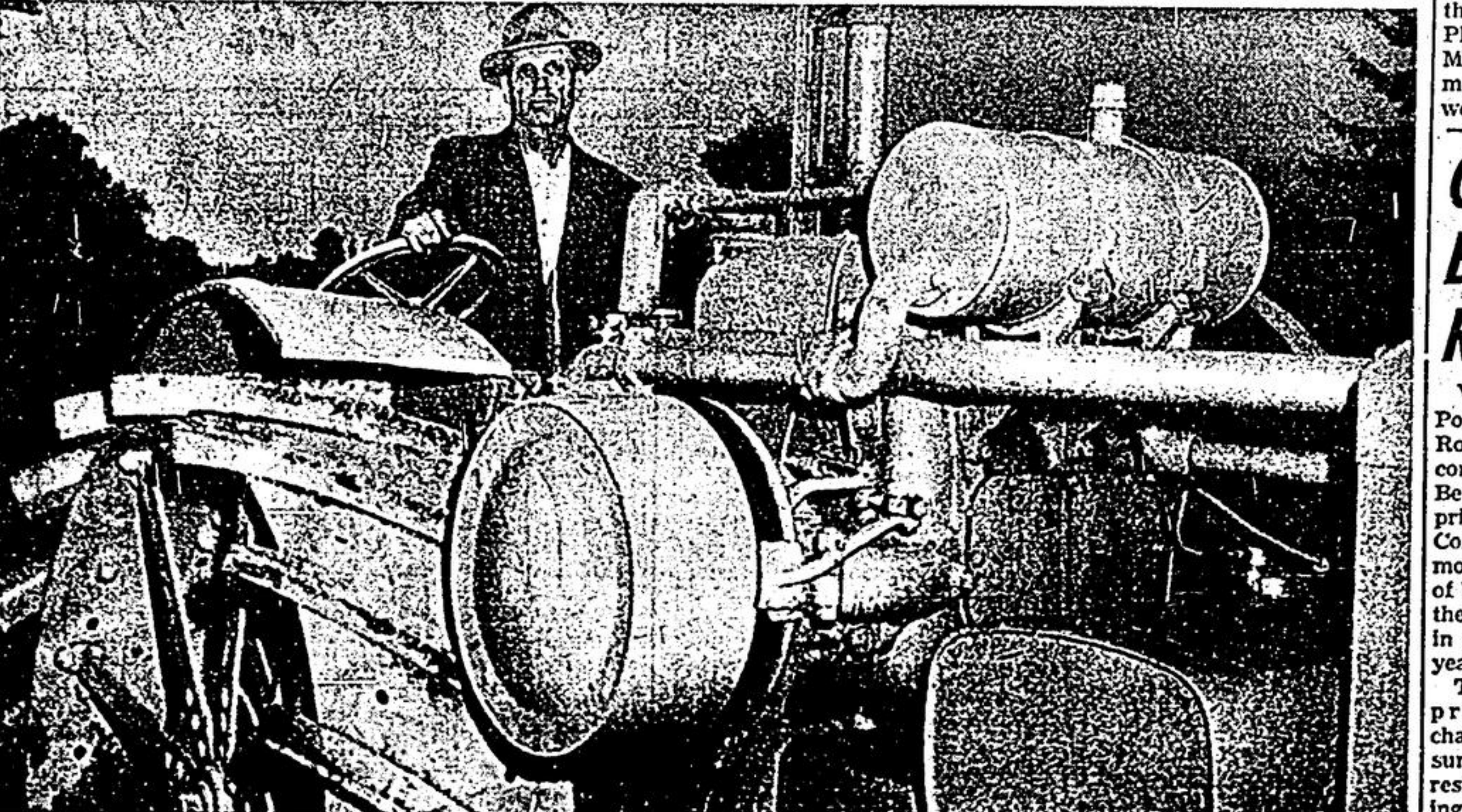
Mr. James Murby, operator of the King Cole Duck Farm, conc. 5, Whitchurch Twp., has defended his pipe-laying project that daily brings hundreds of gallons of water from a community stream to his 92 acre premises almost one mile away. Mr. Murby was contacted by The Tribune this week after a delegation of farmers in the area complained that a stream, that served their properties was being drained dry.

Mr. Murby explained that the program was never, at any time a secret to the township council. He said that he required approval to lay the pipe in the road allowance and some council members had visited the duck farm when the water level became dangerously low. Mr.

Smallest Pipe Mr. Murby said that the pipe-laying project had cost the firm about \$12,000. A six inch main is the smallest available according to the owner. It replaces a three inch plastic pipe that was laid in 1953.

"We keep a close check on the water levels every day," said Mr. Murby. He pointed out that a resident upstream had drained two of his ponds recently and they had taken advantage of this excess run-off.

"These farmers are taxpayers in the township like ourselves and we certainly wish to cooperate in every way we can," said the owner. He noted that the current summer season had been an exceptionally dry one which did not improve the situation.
