Sunday Dance Hall Operator Fined \$25

The operator of a Pickering Township dance hall was fined \$25 and costs last week for providing a performance to which an admission was charged on a Sunday. Frank Hibbert, operator of the Grand Valley Park, appeared before Magistrate Crawford Guest in Whitby Police Court.

Similar charges of contravening the Lord's Day Act on June 3 and June 1 against Hibbert and his son Robert were adjourned until Nov. 20 by His Worship, Crown Attorney Bruce Affleck told the court that defence counsel Gordon Wetstein planned to appeal Tuesday's conviction, hence the adjournment on the other two charges.

PC John Found, of the Pickering Township Police Department, said that on Sunday, May 2, he had visited the Grand Valley Park and found from 250 to 300 persons inside, most of them dancing to music from a record player.

He said that Hibbert first told him that the admission to the dance pavilion was 75 cents per person but later explained that admission to the park was 75 cents.

In his own defence, Hibbert claimed that the 75-cent admission was paid at the park gates. The dance hall was open to all who entered the park, he said, and all he did was supply the record playing machine. He said that only on nights when an orchestra was supplied did he charge admission to the dance. These nights, he said, were work nights.

He also told the court that he employed men "to keep things in line around the dance pavilion" on Sunday night dances.

Defence counsel Wetstein was cut short by Magistrate Guest when he submitted that his interpretation of the Lord's Day Act excluded Sunday afternoon.

The township, in a referendum, last year approved theatrical performances, moving pictures, drive-in theatres, concerts and lectures be held on Sunday.

Mr Wetstein said that providing the music might be interpreted as providing a concert.

"Some feel modern music could be termed a concert," he said. "The music was there and people just wanted to get up and dance."

Crown Attorney Bruce Affleck pointed out that dancing was not included in the type of Sunday performances included in the township's by-law.

The conviction followed.

Large Scale Safety Program Planned For Uxbridge Students

Under the direction of P. C. Tom Fortner of the Uxbridge Town Police Department, more than 1,000 students from two public schools and one high school will be included in a large-scale safety program next month.

The Consumer's Gas Co., the Ontario Motor League and the Dept. of Highways are co-operating to the full.

"The promotion will include the formation of student safety patrols, an auto safety lane for the checking of cars, and individual drive's tests.

Three autos have been obtained from the Uxbridge Wreckers and these will be purposely wrecked to reveal first-hand the impact involved in such a crash. The safety program will be officially opened on Friday, Oct. 26 at 2 p.m.

"We intend to work around the clock to make Uxbridge accident-free," said Constable Fortner, "we have a lot of school children here and we want to keep them."

P. C. Fortner told The Tribune that he had received excellent support from the Mayor, Mr Stan Beach and from councilor, Stuart Ball, chairman of the police committee. He said that the Chief, Mr L. A. Ellenberger also favoured the plan which has been in the formation stage for the past two months.
