one mechanical fault of used cars (and some new ones) was excessive oil consumption.

The fact that this complaint is seldom heard

these days is due largely to the research and efficiency of several firms that produce precision piston rings for the auto makers. Their unsung accomplishments have virtually made the incredibly high efficiency of today's

combustion engine possible. The acceptable standard for rings was to get 600 miles per quart, after the break-in period, for 25,000 miles without engine scuffing or blow-by. Now that standard is 1500 to 2000 miles per quart for 50,000 to 100,000 miles in an engine in which pressures, temperatures and speeds have climbed enormously.
