\$181,900 for Residential Building, Markham Twp.

The value of residential building in Markham Township in September was \$181,900, according to the report of the Building Inspector this week. Industrial and commercial building amounted to \$12,000 and public buildings \$ 42,000. The large proportion of the last item was for the new Roman Catholic Church on Bayview.

Police Report Markham Township police officers answered 724 calls in September and travelled 12,925 miles in the performance of their duties.
