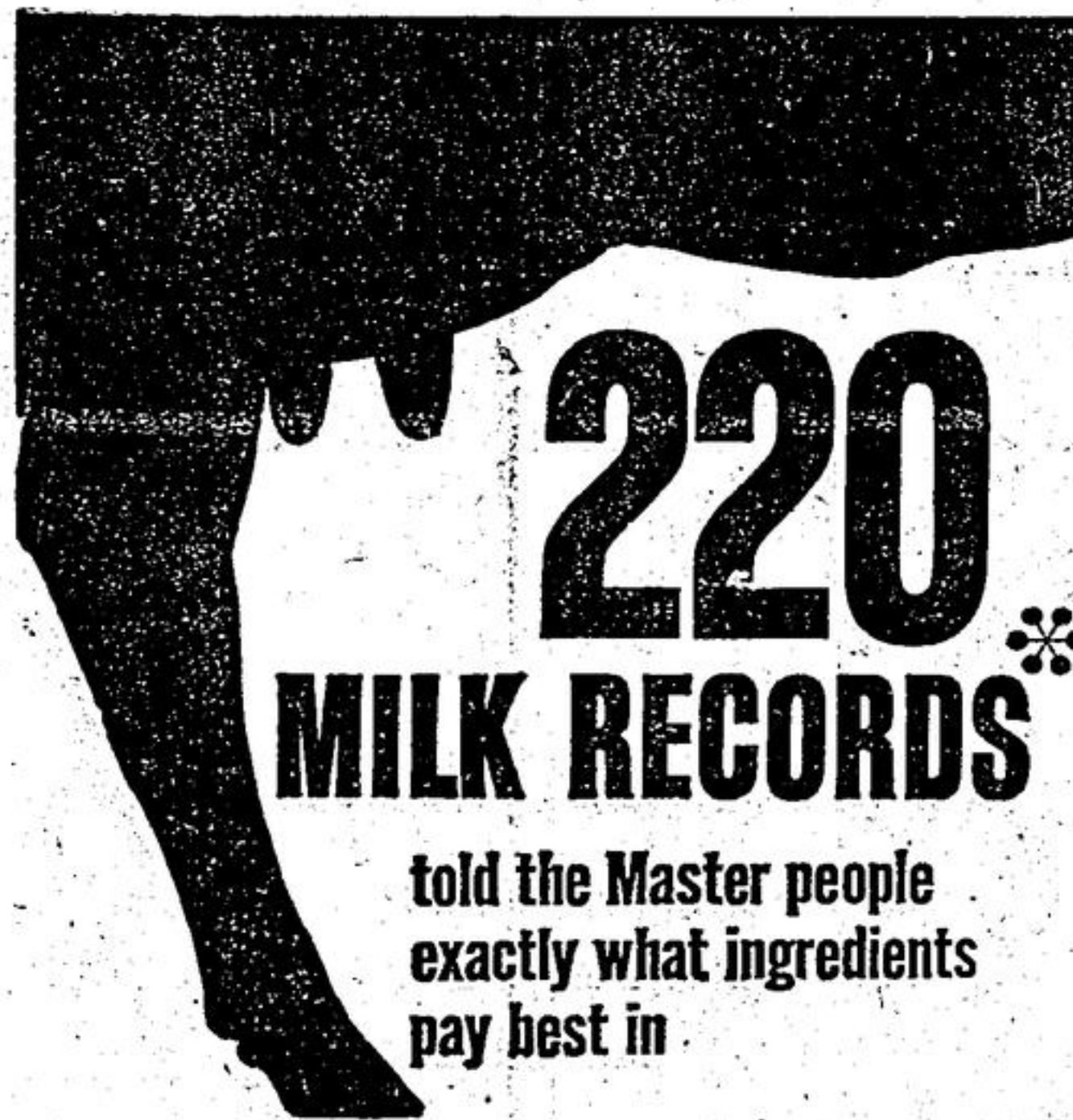

\$181,900 for Residential Building, Markham Twp.

The value of residential building in Markham Township in September was \$181,900, according to the report of the Building Inspector this week. Industrial and commercial building amounted to \$12,000 and public buildings \$42,000. The large proportion of the last item was for the new Roman Catholic Church on Bayview.

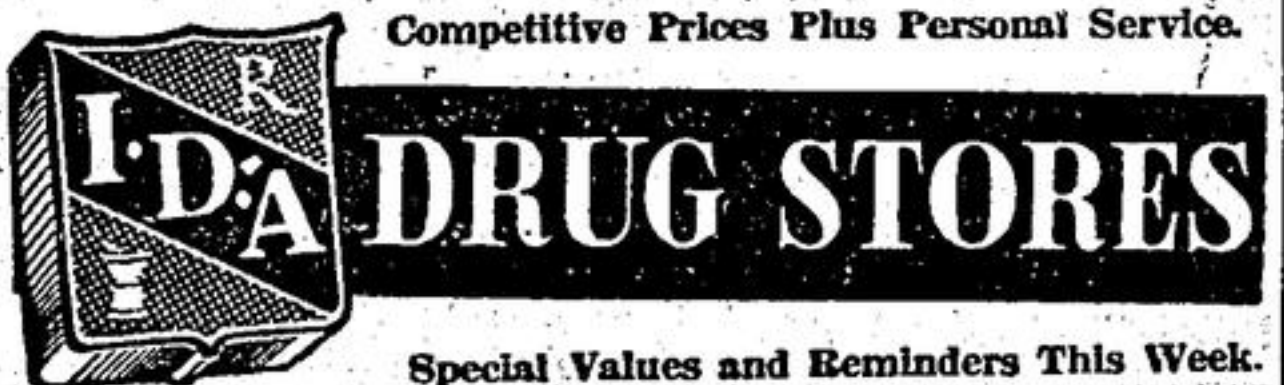
