It is believed the fire smoldered for some time before it was discovered. The Richmond Hill Fire Dept. was called.

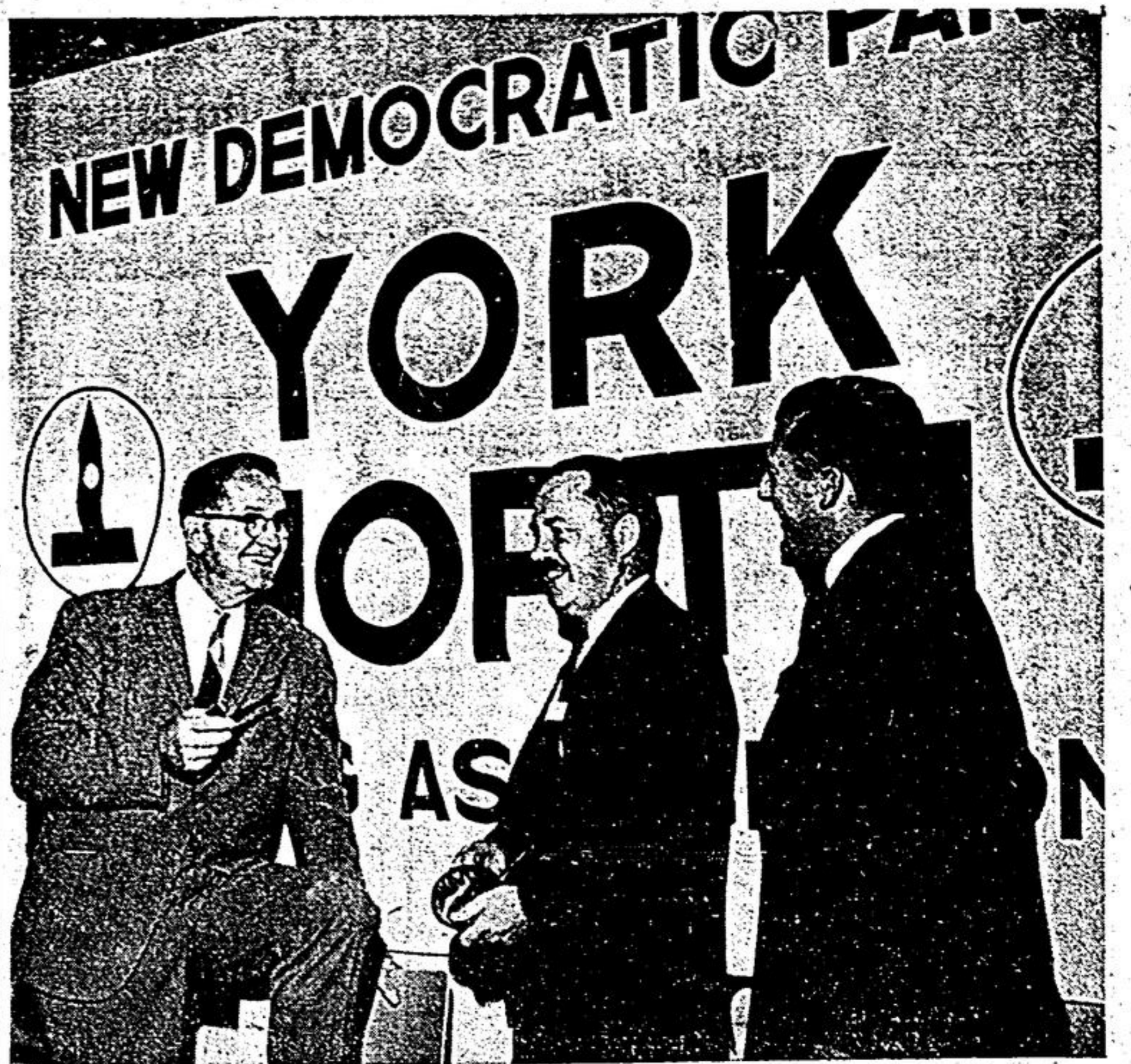
