All Local Minor Hockey Players Must Wear Helmets

The Stouffville Minor Hockey Association will comply with an OMHA ruling and all their players including those in Midget ranks will be required to wear regulation helmet headgear.

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association approved the motion on at the 29th annual meeting on Saturday, Nov. 3rd. The ruling will become effective, January 1, 1963.

The goaltender is exempt from the regulation and may wear a helmet only if he wishes. The referee will not begin play if any player appears on the ice without this equipment.

The motion, presented by an Orillia delegate was the subject of considerable discussion before it was approved 144-96.

President Ted Elmes was re-elected for a second term, as were his top executives, Albert Watkins of Peterborough, Doug Patterson of Stirling, Stan Stokes of London, Gary McLeod and J. Whiston of Toronto.

The seven-man executive committee elected by the delegates includes Lloyd Davidson of Chatham, Cliff Gabel of Preston, Gord Hawes of Wabigoon, Jim Kinkley of Napanee, Les Oswald of Forest, and Stu Reid of Bracebridge.

These six men were all members of last year's committee and the only newcomer is John Roxborough Jr. of Simcoe who replaces Eric Wessely of Owen Sound, who resigned midway through his last term.

No person with any connection with professional hockey will be entitled to stand for election for any OMHA post. The membership decided to keep the "selfish interest" out of the organization.

In his annual report secretary McLeod revealed that last season was a record-breaker for number of players and team entries.

"Local league activities jumped from 34,880 players in 1960-61 to 39,160 in 1961-62," said McLeod. In direct OMHA affiliation, team registrations showed an increase from 532 teams to 629, and individual players moved from 11,840 to 12,300.

Uxbridge Netminder Makes 61 Saves In Community Lg. Game

Uxbridge netminder, Peter King was the busiest man in the Stouffville Arena on Friday night. In a sixty-minute contest with Stouffville, the padded puck-stopper blocked a total of 61 shots, Stouffville shut-out their Uxbridge rivals 8-0.

Stouffville goaltender, Geo. Wilkins enjoyed a rather relaxed evening and chalked up his initial shutout of the season.

Pete Lacey, Guy Weeks and Dick Hamilton were two-goal marksmen for the winners. Con Phinney and Jim Cruikshank fired singles.

Uxbridge held their rivals to only three goals in the first frame as netminder, King was bombarded with 37 shots.

In the second period, Stouffville rattled five pucks into the Uxbridge cage.

Greenwood Wins Third Straight

A goal-hungry Greenwood - Mt. Zion team rolled to their third straight Community League victory on Friday night, thumping Ballantrae 7-3 in a hard-fought contest. The result was actually in doubt until the final three minutes when Greenwood marksmen pumped three pucks past young netminder, Bruce Strong in the Ballantrae cage.

In their three games to date, Greenwood has collected a total of 22 goals with 9 against them. They will battle Stouffville in this Friday's opener at 8 p.m.

Greenwood grabbed a 3-1 lead in the first period on tallies by Vern Ferguson (2) and Lorne Disney. Bob Moffatt made it 4-1 early in the final frame before the Ballantrae hockey machine started to roll. Rae Pipher and Jim Meyers cut the Greenwood lead to one and they threatened to even the count when forward Lorne Disney picked up a penalty. Goaltender, Jerry Brett was equal to the occasion and turned aside a volley of shots.

With Greenwood's return to full strength, they sewed up the victory with 3 tallies in less than 3 minutes. Ron Jones, Bob Moffatt and Vern Ferguson scored in that order. Jim O'Sullivan was the other Ballantrae marksman.

Neil Pascoe, the league's leading point-scorer was blocked on numerous bids but managed to pick up 4 assists to boost his production to 3 goals and 8 assists for 11 points. Although the combination of Ferguson and Pascoe figured in four of the seven Greenwood goals, the trio of Payne, White and Malcolm continues to impress Coach Les Wilson. Greenwood has shown no shortage of player personnel, something that has plagued them in some previous seasons. They Gressed fifteen men on Friday. Ballantrae iced eleven.

Madill Extends Shut-Out Streak To Three Games

Goaltender, Ross Madill extended his shutout record to three straight games and his Ringwood team chalked up their third straight victory in a scheduled Community League contest on Friday night. They blanked Markham "Aces" 4-0.

Both clubs set a fast pace and all the scoring was packed into the final frame. Matt Kinard, last season's point-scoring champion, potted a pair. Singles came from the sticks of Harold Hodgson and Jim Wells.

Netminder, Madill performed well between the pipes but was given solid defence protection. His finest save of the night came on a rink-long dash by Markham's Al Tidbury in the first period. He jockeyed his way across the blue line but Madill held fort on a hard drive.

Markham had him bouncing around like a rubber ball at the midway mark in the first frame with forward Jake Harman in the penalty box. He stopped everything they could throw in his direction.

It was Markham's best effort to date in spite of the loss. They have yet to register a victory in three starts.

With only minutes left in the contest, two stalwart pugilists, Ronnie Guy of Ringwood and Dave Winnitoy of Markham became embroiled in a bare-fisted fight and although some well-placed blows were landed, neither was injured. For rearguard, Winnitoy, it was his second major of the game. He was involved in a scuffle with forward, Jake Harman, earlier in the contest.

Patrick Motors of Stouffville submitted the lowest of eleven tenders on a gravel truck and sander for the Twp. of Pickering. The Patrick price was \$7,329.89 plus tax.
