SEEK ADVICE ON DUCK FARM WATER PROBLEM

Whitchurch Township Council will seek advice from Solicitor J. D. Lucas with regard to the complaint of residents along the Bogart Creek that the King Cole Duck Farm on the Aurora sideroad was taking too much water from the stream. The land owners' latest complaint urged that council take action before the freeze-up as they feared the flow would be so small the water would freeze, leaving the people down the stream without any supply. Council admitted that they could force the company to remove the pipe-line from the road allowance, but thought this action too drastic. They did comment firmly however, that something must be done since the Duck Farm owners were now in a position to drain the creek at any time since they have installed a six-inch pipe in place of a three-inch, and have plenty of pumps to force the pressure.

The Water Resources Commission from whom council had been seeking help, reported only that they could take action if the firm did not cease dumping feathers and other refuse into the stream. However, the company, it was stated, had now remedied this complaint by installing a number of ponds and shallow wells through which the water must pass prior to being drained from the final well and sprayed on the land. The O.V.R.C. did not make any comment that the taking of 175 gallons of water per minute from the stream should be any hardship to others.

It was stated that the company closes operations at the end of December so that there will be a decrease in use of the water. This may also delay any action on the matter this year.

Committal Warrants Issued Against Dog Owners

Township Officer Geo. Crittendon, appeared before Whitchurch council Monday night to advise that committal warrants in court had been issued against a number of township residents for default of payment of dog fines. He presented a list of five, being Allen Needham of Lake Wilcox, for two dogs \$22; Wm. Inglis \$8.50; O. E. Scott Gormley \$8.50; Victor Ferruson \$8.50 and Stanley Hall \$8.50.

All Councils Approve High School Extension

All three municipal councils concerned with the financing of Stouffville District High School have now given their approval of the \$260,000 addition to be erected on the school next year. The High School Board also received the firm decision of the Dept. of Education this week that the Department would pay their grant on \$200,000 of the total amount.

Stouffville municipal council will now seek the consent of the Ontario Municipal Board for the issuing of debentures prior to placing the request before County Council that the debentures be issued through the county.

THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF STOUFFVILLE

The following question will be submitted to the electors of the Village of Stouffville:

"Are you in favour of acquiring land for the purpose of sites for the establishment and carrying on of industries and industrial operations and uses incidental thereto?"

I, R. E. Corner, Clerk of the Village of Stouffville hereby certify that the above is a true copy of the question that will be submitted.

The vote on the said question shall be taken at the municipal election on December 3rd, 1962 between the hours of 10:00 A.M. in the forenoon and 8:00 P.M. in the afternoon.

The Municipal Offices shall be the place where and Monday, December 3rd, 1962 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon shall be the time when the Clerk of the Village of Stouffville will sum up the number of votes in the affirmative and the negative on the question.

The Municipal Offices shall be the place where and 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Friday November 30th, 1962 shall be the time when the Reeve shall appoint persons to attend at the Polling place and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in the affirmative and on behalf of the persons interested in the negative in respect of the said question.

The above question is submitted for the sole purpose of obtaining an opinion from the electors.

An affirmative vote does not authorize Council to purchase industrial sites without submitting the question again to obtain the assent of the electors qualified to vote on money by-laws" or "by obtaining the approval of the Department of Municipal Affairs" to make such purchase.

In either case a By-Law of Council would be required stating the amount of money required for the said purpose before submitting the question to the electors; or before approval from the Department is requested.

When a by-law of a Municipality providing for the expenditure of public funds to purchase lands for industrial purposes is referred to the Department of Municipal Affairs for approval, the Department will not dictate as to the purchase price of the lands but it will carefully scrutinize any sale or lease of lands for industrial purposes, and will not approve any sale whereby the Municipality sells or leases the land at a loss to the Municipality in order to offer an inducement to an industry to locate in the Municipality. It is also contrary to the Municipal Act for a Municipality to enter into any Agreement for a fixed assessment with an industry for any period of time.

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
