iWhen a by-law of a Municipality providing for the expenditure of public funds to purchase lands for industrial purposes is referred to the Department of Municipal Affairs for approval. the Department will not dictate as to the purchase price of the lands but it will carefully scrutinize any sale or lease of lands for industrial purposes, and will not approve any sale whereby the Municipality sells or leases the land at a loss to the Municipality in order to offer an inducement to an industry to locate in the Municipality. It is also contrary to the Municipal Act for a Municipality to enter into any Agreement for a fixed assessment with an industry for any period of time.
