## Final Day Of Appeals For Whitchurch Twp.

Whitchurch Township Court of Revision went into its second day of hearings on Wednesday. There are 48 appeals in all to be heard by the Court.

Wilford C. Barber, lot 14, conc. 3, has 43 acres of land assessed at \$930. A survey shows that highway 404 will take 13 acres off the property for which Mr Barber stated he had no settlement to date. He admitted the highway dept. had to expropriate. Assessor Kennedy said he had had no advice to date but an adjustment would be made when the land was taken.

Peter and Margaret Posnikoff, also in conc. 3, have land assessed at \$525, and two houses, together valued at \$5,700. The property consists of 50 acres. The owner contended that he

was a farmer, although he operates a manufacturing company in the city. He said he had all the machinery for working the farm, rents other land in the township and keeps over 50 head of cattle. He said he hired labour and is the farm manager. Assessor Kennedy told the Court that the Act is very explicit, that a residence occupied by a person not solely engaged in farming, and it states, the residence will bear a separate assessment. When asked said manufacturer and farmer but two designations are not allowed.

The owner said he intended to withdraw gradually from his manufacturing endeavor and intended to develop into a "push button" farm operation. The Court upheld the Assessor but it was expected the case would be appealed to a Judge.

**Ballantrae Mfg. Appeals**  
K. A. Rodgers, lot 20, conc. 6, appealed on an assessment of \$5,810, an increase of \$1510 over the former year. The assessor drew attention to the fact that Mr Rodgers had added a building 23 by 32 feet, and the house had been bricked in front and part of the rear. The appellant expressed satisfaction at the explanation.

He also appeared on an appeal by the Erie Mfg. Co. of Ballantrae where a considerable increase had also been made. The assessor stated that last year the company was in the progress of converting a farm building to a factory.

Assessments were sustained on the property of Mr and Mrs W. E. Trent, lot 4, Wilcox Lake, the Onway Construction Co. and Shirley Austerdyck, conc. 6.

**Snack Bar Reduced**  
Mr Sydney Jenkins, 8th conc., had his assessment reduced from \$1370 to \$860. This assessment was on buildings. Since it is a snack bar serving Musselman's Lake and is only for seasonal use, the Court made the reduction.

Robt. Nicholson, conc. 6, who purchased a ten-acre lot for \$4500 received no reduction on his \$1760 assessment. He said the assessment was too high as there was no income off the land. Like a number of cases, once these ten-acre parcels of land are separated from the farm, they are under separate assessment and find they must bear a reasonable share of the upkeep of the township.

## TOO MUCH WATER CAN RUIN CEMENT

The most common mistake of the amateur in the mixing of concrete is the addition of too much water. Concrete made with too much water hardens into a mass that appears to be very strong. But is usually only half as durable as concrete made with the correct volume of water.

The condition of the sand used is closely related to the amount of water you'll need. About 5 gallons of water is

recommended for each sack of Portland cement, but this will vary depending on whether the sand is wet or dry. With very wet sand you may need only 4 gallons, with very dry 6 gallons.

When using a pre-mix, the bag tells how much water should be added. The problem arises when only a portion of a bag is needed. Care should be taken to see that the proportion is correct.

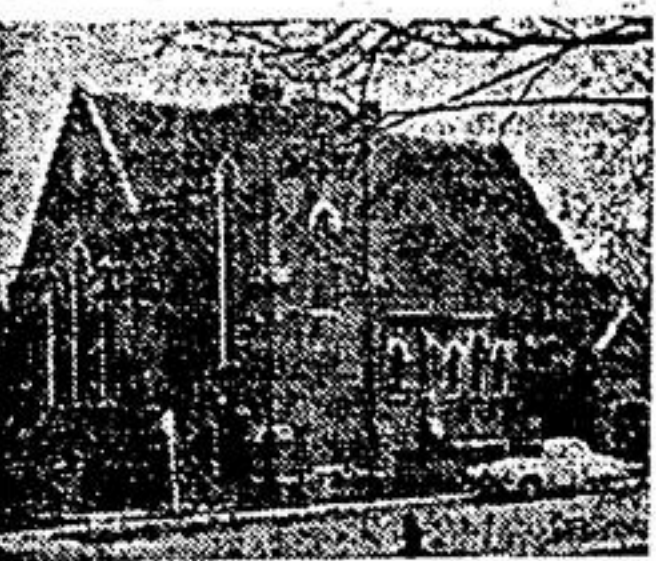
