### Sunday School Hunter Safety Training Program

**GOLDEN TEXT:** But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of Him who hath called you out of darkness into His marvellous light. 1 Peter 2:9.

Approach to the Lesson  
 Certainly there is in the world today an articulate body that does give vital witness to the reality of the living Christ. And this spiritual brotherhood (the Church) has continued throughout the centuries despite the most determined efforts to destroy it. This phenomena can be explained only of a supernatural dynamic. And this dynamic is the Holy Spirit. To many, however, the word church applies basically to that great mass of persons who profess allegiance to the Christian religion, while to others it indicates one of the several branches of Christendom. To still others it signifies one of the denominations. Or again, the term embraces only some local congregation. Still it may be used to describe a building that is dedicated for religious usage.

So let us examine together the Church.  
**Heart of the Lesson**  
 The New Testament employs at least three significant symbols of the Christian Church — a body, a building, and a bride. All three are found in Paul's letter to the Ephesians.

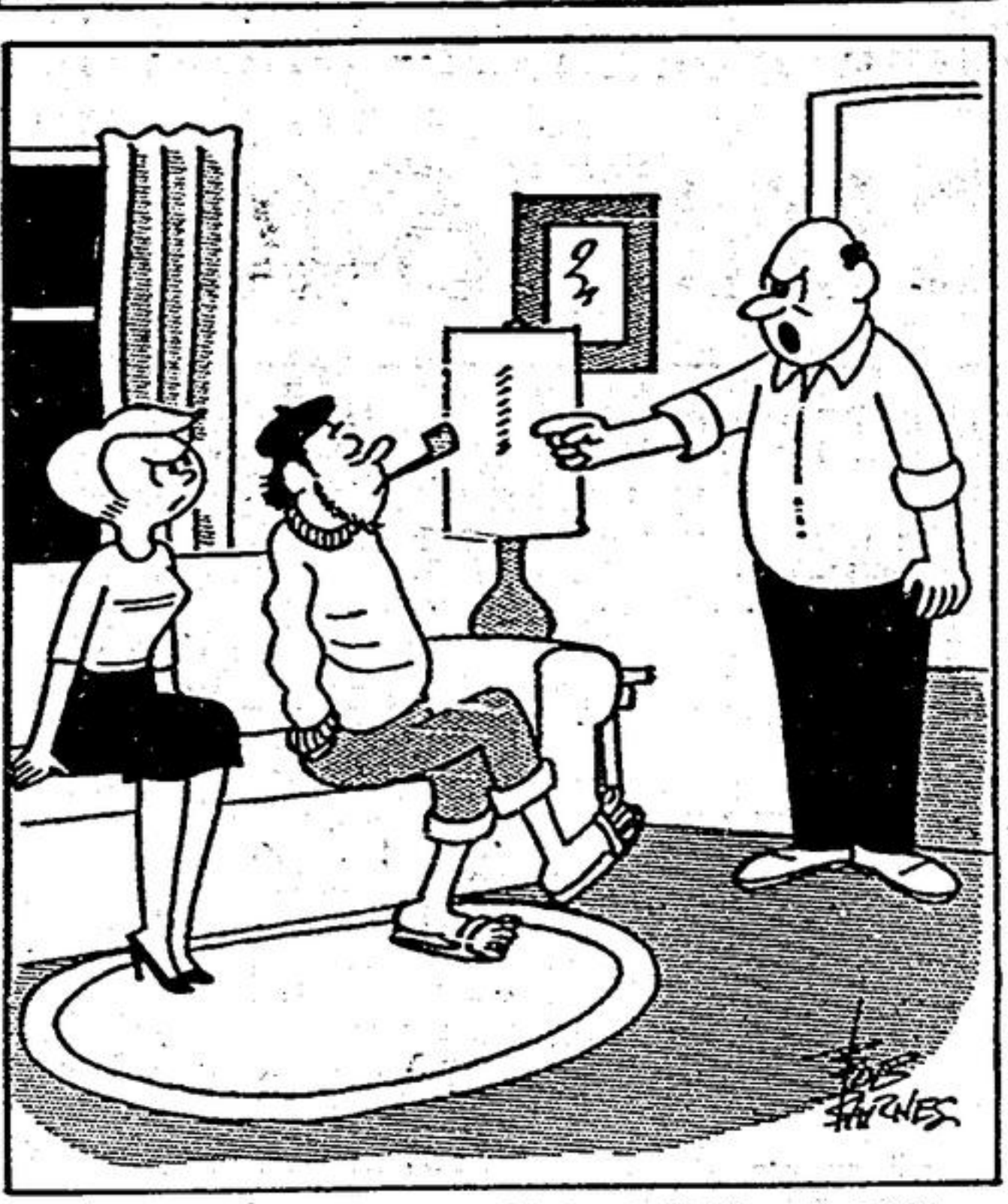
In the first chapter of Ephesians Paul alludes to "the church, which is his 'body'". This suggests life. In the second chapter he likens it to a building. This suggests an indweller. In the fifth chapter there is a clear analogy between the Church and a bride. Such a relationship demands love.

The similarity between functions of the human body and Christ's Church is fully developed in 1 Corinthians 12, and provides the basis for some very practical exhortations. From Christ, the glorified head in Heaven, flows divine life to every member of that body on earth. Moreover, every member is dependent upon the head for its direction, and interdependent upon every other member for its normal and proper function.

At the threshold of Israel's history God commanded His people to build Him a sanctuary that He might dwell among them. This was later superseded by Solomon's magnificent Temple. Today, however, God "dwelleth not in temples made with hands." The Church — all believers who are vitally linked with the Lord Jesus Christ — has become a holy dwelling place of God by His Spirit.

Finally, the Church is likened to a bride who is the object of the supreme sacrificial love of her bridegroom. And lest objection be raised to the application of the simile of both body and bride to the same company, it should be remembered that precisely this was true of Eve. She was Adam's body as well as his bride, and it is to this fundamental relationship that reference is here made.
