The Canadian nickel has had 12 sides since 1943 when the government changed the composition of the coin to conserve nickel, a strategic wartime

The substitute was an alloy of copper and zine which produced a coin of almost the same colour as the penny. It was called the "tombac," the name for copper-zinc alloys.

Twelve sides were supposed to avoid confusion between the copper-zinc coin and the ordinary copper. But the diffence sometimes wasn't enough and five-cent coins often were mis-

taken for coppers. Because of the confusion, the mint switched to chrome-plated steel coins in 1944 and 1945. hairy. When the war ended, use of pure nickel was resumed. But the 12-sided design was not changed.

N. A. Parker, master of the mint, said in an interview the new rounded nickel will carry growth, it may need watering the same design as the present only twice a week. nickel—a profile of the Queen on the "head" side and a beaver on the "tail." The weight and diameter also will be the same.


