Markham Dist. Man Convicted of Having House-Breaking Tools

An unemployed Markham father of two was found guilty on Thursday of possession of housebreaking tools and remanded in custody until Dec. 10 for sentence.

A 12-member Ontario County Petty Jury, three of which were female members, returned its verdict of guilty as charged against Robert Lloyd Wideman, 23, after an hour and 30 minutes deliberation.

The jury found Wideman not guilty on a second charge of attempted theft from a Bell Telephone pay telephone.

Judge Alex C. Hall remanded the accused in custody for sentence at the next sitting of the General Sessions of the Peace for Ontario County, Dec. 10.

The jury ruled there was not sufficient evidence against the accused to support a conviction on the attempted theft charge.

The witness told the jury Wideman was searched at the Dunbarton police station after he and another Crown witness, Constable Robert Speakman returned after a check of a damaged pay telephone and booth at the West Rouge Shopping Centre in Pickering Township.

Sgt. Richard Bodley said nothing was found on the person of the accused. He said after he returned to the police station from the shopping plaza he began questioning Wideman.

He told solicitor Harry Rose Wideman was not cautioned or warned he was under arrest until just before he was lodged in police cells.

He told the defence counsel that a pair of brown kid gloves were found on the dash board of Wideman's car but the accused was wearing a pair of odd gloves on the morning he was arrested, Jan. 29.

But Sgt. Bodley admitted to the defence counsel, the accused had a sore hand and was

wearing a skin tight elastic bandage. He said the right glove appeared to be larger than the left one.

The witness agreed with the defence counsel that a towel in which was wrapped a heavy steel bar and screwdriver, found stuffed behind the front seat, on the passenger's side of Wideman's car could be used for wiping the windshield.

Mr. Rose asked "can you see anything wrong with a motorist having a screwdriver in his car?"

Sgt. Bodley replied, "No."

Mr. Rose suggested there was not a "tittle" of evidence that any of the items found in Wideman's car were removed from the car and used to attempt to steal coins from the pay telephone.

The witness admitted under cross-examination that he had no knowledge of when the telephone and booth had been damaged.

The defence counsel suggested there was no evidence that any of the articles in that car were used to attempt to steal money from that telephone. He suggested there was no evidence that Wideman used any of the equipment found in his car to damage the telephone.

Crown Attorney W. Bruce Affleck, in his address to the jury described the case for the Crown as "not complicated."

He said the Crown was obliged to rely on inferences.

"As far as breaking and entering is concerned," Mr. Affleck told the jury, "a person would not attempt it at noon-hour in a busy shopping centre. It would be done at night," he said.

Mr. Affleck said there were two obvious lies told by the accused when he was being questioned.

These lies, he said, not only warranted an investigation but warranted a charge.

Based on the evidence and demonstrations made with the instruments, Mr. Affleck said, there was no other reasonable explanation but that the accused was attempting to steal coins from the pay telephone and did have in his possession burglar tools.

Mr. Rose, in his address to the jury, said it appeared to him that the Crown had based its entire case on theory. What evidence is there that Wideman did anything unlawful on the night in question, Mr. Rose questioned.

He told the jury it must look upon the case with an open mind, not prejudiced and not as judged on the facts, not on "dipsy-doodle theories," as suggested by the Crown.

He said that in all his years of experience he "wouldn't convict a dog on that evidence."
