### LIGHT A FACTOR IN HOUSE PLANTS

Light is an essential factor for plant growth, but the amount and intensity of light that individual plants need varies greatly.

During the long days of spring and summer when the sun is very hot and bright, many plants such as African Violets and Cinerarias may need to be shaded during part of the day.

Now that winter is here, with short daylight periods most house plants should be placed in the brightest locations.

All Philodendrons, English Ivy, Sansevieria, Dracaena, and the Rubber plant are shade tolerant, and will survive in diffused light or in a north window.

When grown in windows, plants tend to bend towards the light. To counteract this phenomenon (phototropism), horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture advise giving the pots a quarter turn each day.

You'd better be prepared to take full advantage of what warm days there are left. Think of what it's going to cost to keep warm come winter.
