Win Timbers Returned As Reeve; Ken Betz New Council Member

Reeve Win Timbers of Stouffville was returned to office for a second term on Monday as former reeve Ken Wagg failed in his bid to return to office. Mr. Timbers' majority was 182, slightly higher than in 1961 when he first won the seat from Mr. Wagg. The Reeve received his strongest support in the east end of town where his majority was an even hundred. He was 21 ahead with the first returns from the south side downtown poll, and continued to gain as the other results were tallied. There was no election for deputy-reeve, Ken Laushway having received an acclamation.

Councillor Bud Spang again topped the polls for council as he did in his initial run last year. He polled 877 votes which was 260 ahead of his nearest oppenent and council's newest member Ken Betz. Mr. Betz made a creditable showing with 617 votes getting steady support in every poll. Councillor Parsons with 490 votes was approximately one hundred ahead of Mr. Slack who was trying for a comeback this year. The two unsuccessful candidates, Mr. Slack and Mr. Wood were only separated by about fifty votes. Both bottom men fell off considerably in the voting at No. 3 poll, the west


