Uxbridge Tp. Council Given Acclamation

There will be no election in the Township of Uxbridge. At the nomination meeting on Friday evening, Norman Hogg moved from deputy-reeve up to the reeveship without opposition, and the deputy-reeveship was filled by Alvin Redshaw, also uncontested. Donald Jackson and Charles Forsyth were returned as councillors and Arthur Knight will fill the vacancy.

Nominations were also made for Grant Hill and Grant Dreyer, but since neither man was present, nor had given written consent, both were ineligible.

Reeve Reviews Year Reeve Earl Dowse, who was also Warden of Ontario County in 1962, addressed the ratepayers' gathering of some eighty-five persons and touched mainly on the two large road department expenditures made this year. A new grader had been purchased from the J. D. Adams company at cost of \$23,835 and the purchase of a gravel pit at \$14,000. He said that the purchase of gravel from private sources had been unsatisfactory, and council had received the consent of the Department of Highways to buy a pit as well as the consent of the Ontario Municipal Board to issue the necessary debentures.

He told the audience that the Centre Rd. north of Uxbridge had been surveyed and the owners contacted from whom it was necessary to buy frontage. No actual work of widening had been done to date.

The township wolf bounty had been increased by \$15 but had only been called on to make two payments.

Favoured Deer Season Norman Hogg, the newly acclaimed reeve, said that a county vote on an open deer season in Ontario had been turned down although he himself had favoured the action. Deer were becoming very plentiful in Ontario County and there had been complaints of crop damage.

He said that the agricultural committee of which he was a member had expended a budget of some \$10,000, on fall fair grants, agricultural prizes and grants to farmers establishing farm ponds.

Would Enforce Bylaws Alvin Redshaw, who will be deputy-reeve in 1963, said that more stringent action should be taken in the protection of live stock. He said the township paid claims of \$277 in 1961 but in 1962 the amount soared to \$1450. Fire costs too, he said, had climbed from \$2762 in 1961 to \$3624 in 1962.

Councillor Charles Forsyth recommended that township records needed more protection and thought a vault should be provided. He also thought fire extinguishers should be provided on other township property.

Councillor Donald Jackson defended council's action in not accepting the lowest bid for the new road grader. He said the one purchased was more suitable to the township requirements.

Member of Council wishes to support these people. I don't want to support him at the polls," he continued.

"That's your privilege," said Reeve Scott, "you may vote for whoever you wish." "I think these people have a right to their opinion."

Reeve Scott thanked the speaker for bringing the matter to the attention of the Council. "I am sure that each member will govern himself accordingly," he said.

Water Pipe From 7th Con. Stream Concern Of Farm Deputation

A pipe, tunneled under the 7th concession of Pickering is taxing the supply of water in a neighbourhood stream and is causing some concern among a group of farm residents in the area. On Monday night, a delegation, headed by Mr. Russell Gostick, asked the advice of the township council in solving the problem. He suggested that either the township should take action and return the creek to its original watercourse, inside the boundary line of the property of Mr. Alex Gray or give the deputation permission to move it.

Mr. Gostick informed the council that the stream had been dry throughout much of the summer. He noted that one resident was using large quantities of water and had installed a pressure pump last spring. It was suggested that the water was being used in a private swimming pool.

Councillor Harvey Spang favoured some type of action that would put the stream back in its original location. He contended that, in time, it would prove a threat to the township's road.

Not Council Matter "It seems to me that if we take any stand at all, we would be taking sides in a dispute that is actually a problem between two property-owners," said

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Pickering Tp. Population Over 20,000

The population in the Township of Pickering has soared to 20,652. This is an increase of 1954 over the same period in 1961. A break-down of the population and assessment figures were revealed at a regular meeting of Council on Monday night.

There are 66,909.01 acres in the municipality. The land assessment is \$11,031,335; buildings, \$16,278,305 and business, \$645,740. The total assessment in 1962 shows an increase of \$1,600,100 over 1961.

The population figures in all wards is up over '61 with the sharpest climb in ward 3. It is up by 1,601 persons. Ward I is up by 53 and Ward II by 75.

50% Assess For Small Land Owners

Uxbridge Township Court of Revision has maintained the 50% assessment on all small parcels of land under 20 acres, although the county assessor who did the assessing this year in the township, had reduced these to 40%. The township assessor Fred Clubine had been unable to complete his work due to illness.

The farm home assessment of H. E. Pailsley which was appealed, was reduced \$150, but the assessment on the farm itself was sustained. A building owned by Teresa Winston, and described as a cheese factory, but which was in fact, a cement block house, had the assessment lowered by \$400.

The assessment on 50 acres owned by the Palisades Country Club was sustained, as was that of Earl Sheridan.

Geo. F. Kydd appealed against the increase of his golf course assessment and gained a reduction of .675, also giving a reduction of \$150 in business assessment. Jack Lowe did not appeal the assessment on his golf course but the court felt his figure should be similar and gave him a reduction of \$675 and \$200 in business assessment. A reduction was also granted on the appeal of Mary Temple of \$800 on buildings but no change on farm land.
