BIGGER WATER HEATER PAYS OFF IN COMFORT

Despite the many advances made in appliances and household conveniences, many modern households are limping along with an inadequate supply of hot water. No one would put up with a kitchen range capable of producing a limited number of meals per week.

Yet a good many families are enduring a limited supply of hot water because of an obsolete or inadequate water heater. Not only are personal hot water needs restricted, but it is impossible to get the most of their automatic laundry equipment, dishwashers, etc. If your water heater is functioning properly, and of sufficient capacity, there should be an ample supply available for all uses at any time of day.

At one time or another everyone has had the unpleasant experience of the water suddenly running cold in the shower or bath. This usually signals that the hot water supply has run out. The housewife does not often know, however, when the hot water turns cold in her automatic clothes washer. At the start of the wash cycle it may be hot, then turn cold long before the tub completely fills. The same is true of automatic dishwashers. Neither laundry nor dishes will wash clean in cold water.

Most new houses are equipped by the builder with an automatic water heater powered by electricity, gas or oil. In many cases the installation is made on the basis of a specified minimum size and energy input depending on the size of house, number of bathrooms etc. But while this "minimum size" may be adequate for present needs, it is often found to be completely inadequate as time goes on.

The prospective homeowner who looks ahead can—by paying as little as \$20 more—have the builder install a larger unit. This small amount of money is well spent as it avoids a much larger expenditure in the future.

The minimum size water heater will not be adequate as the family grows and hot water consumption goes up. In most cases it will not satisfy the demands of a new automatic dishwasher without affecting the supply of hot water for other household needs. There is no market for user water heaters. If the homeowner is forced to buy a new, larger water heater to keep up with increased hot water consumption, the minimum cost will be at least \$100. The \$20 outlay at the time the home was purchased would have prevented this.

There are many water heaters on the market. Most are good high quality products, made by reputable Canadian manufacturers. Most water heaters carry a long term guarantee or warranty. The prospective buyer should read the written guarantee carefully. While most manufacturers advertise a 10 year warranty, the terms and conditions vary. Some are better and more liberal than others.

Comm. Softball League Divide \$240.87 for '62

Eight teams in the Claremont Community Softball League grossed a total of \$1,363.65 at the gate during the season of 1962 but after all expenses had been paid, the amount left for division between the entries amounted to \$240.87.

Brougham, this year's champions received the biggest share of this figure — \$60.90. Greenwood Strs., the runners-up, pocketed \$47.88. This amount does not include the return of entry fees.

During the regular schedule of 48 nights, \$1,046.38 was received at the gate. Park rentals consumed the largest share of these receipts in the amount of \$288.00. Umpire fees totaled \$265.00 and softball purchases took an additional \$197.76. A new trophy was put up for competition this year and went to the pennant-winning Goodwood club. It cost \$40.53.

The profits during the regular schedule amounted to \$124.77; the semi-finals — \$77.00 and the finals — \$39.10.

It is rather interesting to note that the total amount of money paid out in park rental at Claremont and Brougham throughout the entire season amounted to \$348.00. During this same period, the umpire fees amounted to exactly the figure — \$348.00. Softballs were used up in the amount of \$238.31. The gatekeepers received \$117.00 for their services during the season.
