Goodwood Postmaster Assaulted; Arrest Thugs In Markham Village

At approximately 10:45 p.m. on Wednesday of last week, two men forced their way into the residence of Mr. Charles Watson, 65 year old general storekeeper and postmaster at Goodwood. Before leaving the premises with an estimated \$200, one of the thieves struck Mr. Watson on the side of the head with a gun butt and left him lying on the floor. Twenty minutes later, a man meeting the description of one of the assailants was spotted by Markham Village Police at the intersection of No. 7 and 48 Hwys. The southbound car was stopped and its four occupants were arrested and handcuffed. They were taken to the Buttonville station in Markham Twp. and later turned over to the Whitby Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police. Charged with robbery with an offensive weapon were — Spencer Duquesne, 20; James White, 23; Donald Beattie, 24 and Allan Modesty, 19, all of Toronto.

Fix Flat Tire

When the two men first appeared at Mr. Watson's home, they said that their car had a flat tire. They were told to go next door to a garage operated by a son, Claude. He was then pulled outside, then shoved back into the premises. While one stood guard, the other went upstairs. It was then that Mr. Watson ran for the door. A scuffle ensued and the victim was hit over the head with a gun. It was only recently that Mr. Watson returned home from hospital after undergoing an operation. He fell to the floor

and "played unconscious" and the two men left. He ran to his son's home nearby and the police were notified.

The telephone call was received at the Buttonville depot in Markham Twp. by P.C. Clifford Cox. Two cruisers were immediately dispatched to cut-off points at Gormley and Ringwood. Markham Village was also alerted. The officers had no description of any vehicle but concentrated their efforts on spotting the two men who were involved in the assault. At about 11:10 p.m., Constables Wm. Vance and Wm. Gunn of Markham Village noticed a possible suspect and gave chase. At the same time, P.C. Al Hudson and P.C. Bruce Findlay of Markham Twp. were instructed to converge on the area. The four men, three Negro and one white offered no resistance when arrested. A coin box was found on the rear seat. A revolver was recovered the next morning by Sgt. Robt. Hood and P.C. Allan Chadwick in a ditch near the scene of the arrest.

Two persons in a second auto, a 1962 Ford, were taken to York County Hospital at Newmarket. Most seriously injured was Mrs. Donna McMahon of Scarborough. Twenty-five stitches

were required to close severe facial lacerations. Mr. McMahon, the driver, was also injured. His car was damaged to the extent of \$1,500.

P.C. Al Hudson of Markham Twp. police conducted the investigation at the scene.

Mr. Wright spent his entire lifetime in the township, enjoying remarkably good health for one of his years. He was identified with the Methodist Church.

Surviving are four sons, Harold of Stouffville; Clifford, Robert and Frank all of Green River; and two daughters, Gertrude (Mrs. Carl Devitt) of Claremont and Jean (Mrs. George Gray) on the home farm. There are eleven grandchildren and fifteen great grandchildren, as well as two brothers, Walter in Alberta and Will in Toronto.

The funeral on Thursday was conducted by Rev. Cresswell of Brougham from the Dixon Funeral Home, Markham. The pallbearers were Jack Mitchell, Harold Mitchell, Charlie Hutchings, Cecil Phillips, Aylmer Carter and Alfred Mitchell. Interment was made in Elmwood Cemetery, Markham.

Mr. Fredrick Wright, one of the oldest residents of Pickering Township, passed away at Fairview Lodge, Whitby, on Monday, Dec. 24th. He was in his 96th year and had been ill for only a short time.

The late Mr. Wright was born in Wales in 1867, and came to Canada at the age of nine, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wright. The family settled

No Change Expected In North York Riding

The provincial riding of York North is likely to be left the same size and shape for the next provincial election expected some time during 1963.

An interim report has been made by the redistribution commission, based on the 1961 census, but it will affect only the ridings within the suburban areas of Metro Toronto. It does not affect the city proper, nor does it extend beyond the northern boundary of Metro, which is Steeles Ave., and the southern boundary of York County and of the provincial riding of York North.

Hon. Mr. Justice E. A. Richardson is commission chairman.

York North is held in the Legislature by Maj. Lex MacKenzie, M.C., Progressive Conservative, whose home is Woodbridge.

The interim report, acceptable to the leaders of the three provincial parties, will carve 10 new ridings out of the Metro area.

York North, for provincial purposes runs from Steeles Ave., north to Lake Simcoe, but for Dominion purposes starts at highway 7 at Thornhill and excludes the village of Woodbridge which is north of the highway.

Population of the riding is approximately 115,000, so some slicing up is likely, but this will not take place before the next provincial election.

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John Brillinger Lifelong Farmer In Whitchurch

Following a short illness, John B. Brillinger, lifelong farmer in Whitchurch Township, passed away at his home on Dec. 22nd. He was born in the township on April 18th, 1876. In 1905 the deceased married Ada Hare who survives him, and together the couple has lived retired for some time.

Mr. Brillinger was identified with the Second Markham Baptist Church. Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Earl and Wesley, both of Whitchurch, and two daughters, Jan (Mrs. Fred Gillham) and Gladys at home. There is also one sister Minnie (Mrs. Ralph Atkinson).
