

# O.S.C.I.A. Convention Dates Jan. 23, 24 and 25

Hugh Glasgow, Chatham, president of the Ontario Soil & Crop Improvement Association, said today that the 1963 Annual Convention would be held on January 23, 24, and 25.

This Convention, held concurrently with the Canada Farm and Industrial Equipment Show, offers farmers the opportunity to participate in discussions on the most recent developments in Crop Production and Soil Management, and also to preview the latest models in farm machinery.

Wednesday morning will be devoted to the business of the Association, and the Registered Seed Growers' of Ontario. Wednesday afternoon program covers the utilization of corn in beef, dairy, and hog rations. Wednesday evening, a session of special interest to seed growers, is held in the Mayfair Room of the King Edward Hotel.

Thursday is devoted to forage crops, featuring an interview with 1962 Pasture Champions and a panel on pasture vs. harvested forage. On the afternoon program Dr. John Baylor of Penn. State College will discuss "Hay Testing", and Dr. Edward Carson, Purdue University will discuss "Crops That Pay". That perennially popular, and ever timely topic, "Looking Ahead", with W. F. Watson, Assistant Deputy Minister, Ontario Department of Agriculture, is again included on the Thursday afternoon program. Thursday evening is the Annual Banquet in the Crystal Ballroom, King Edward Hotel, with the Hon. Wm. A. Stewart as guest speaker.

The Friday program is devoted to Soil and Crop Research, and in addition, a full day's program devoted to the turnip growing industry. A major development in the industry will be recommendations for the successful use of a herbicide on the turnip crop.

An innovation is a Thursday morning and afternoon session on the use and misuse of pesticides. This program is designed to promote the safe and effective use of herbicides, fungicides, and insecticides.

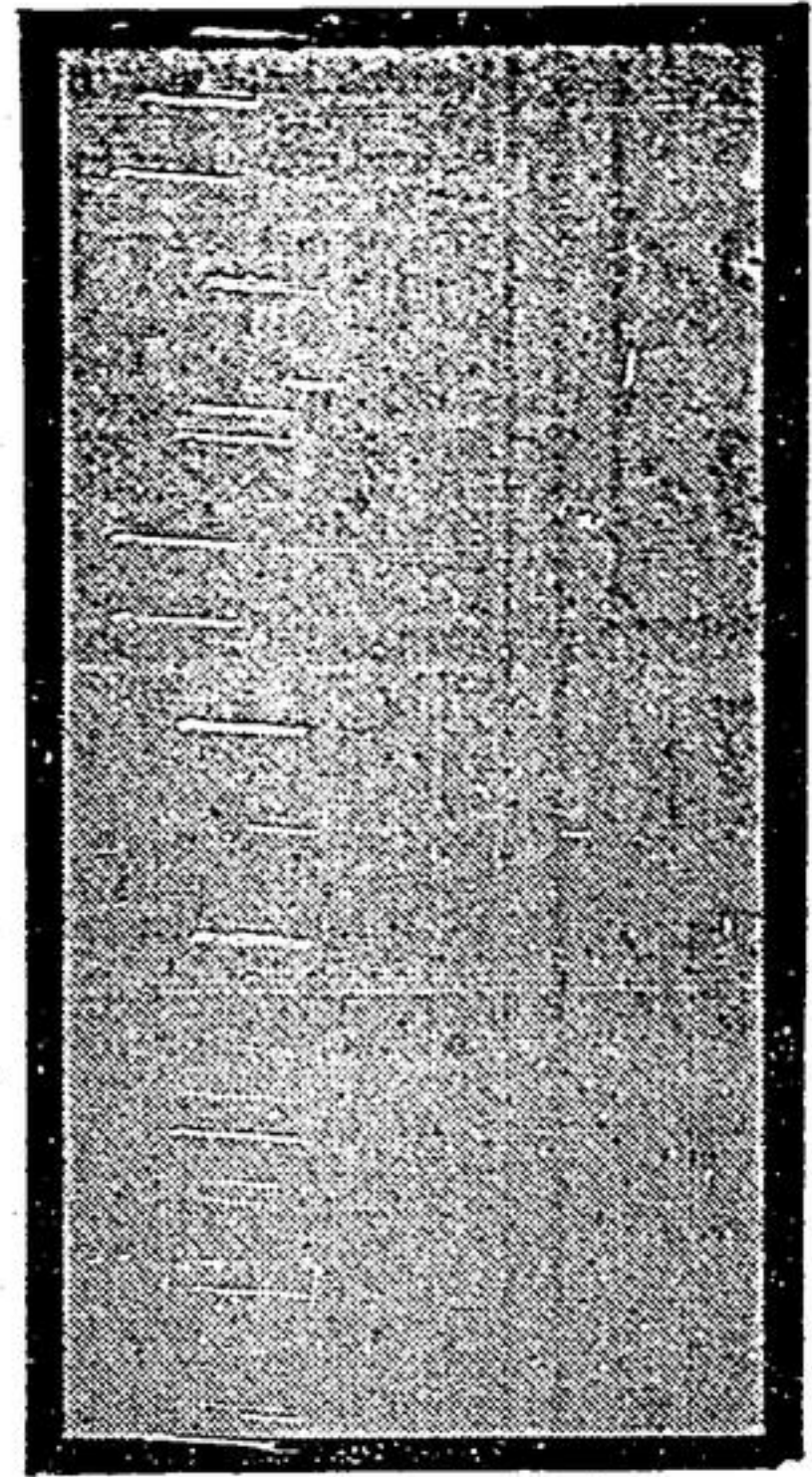
