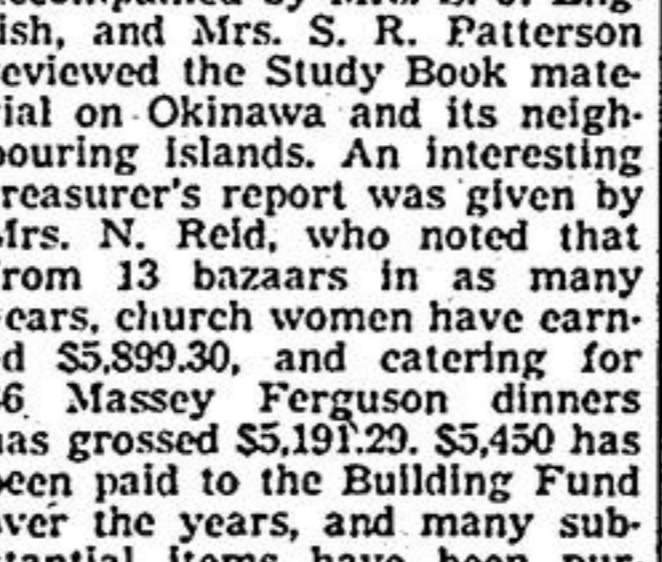
Western holiday guests at the George Oakes home, Mr. Oakes' brother and sister, returned home recently.
